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Dulles Sees Red Threat To Panama Canal

Believed Purpose Of Arms Shipment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today the Reds must have shipped arms to Guatemala in order to build up a Communist bastion near the Panama Canal.

Dulles also declared:

- The United States would support an appeal to the United Nations for the dispatch of a peace observation mission to Southeast Asia. Dulles also said that the prospects for some kind of United Nations action looked better now than they had recently.
- The United States government had made clear to the French in talks now under way the terms and conditions under which it would be possible to consider American intervention in the Indochina War. The conditions include, he emphasized, approval by Congress and the creation of an anti-Communist coalition in Southeast Asia.
- The United States is about to send a new note to Russia on President Eisenhower's proposal for an international atomic energy peace pool. Dulles said that consultations are going forward with Allied countries on the note. Such countries in this case are primarily Britain and France.
- Prime Minister Mendevres of Turkey will visit the United States in the period June 1-4 to discuss economic and financial matters. Dulles discussed the Guatemalan and Indochinese situations in response to questions from reporters after he had issued a statement noting that Guatemala is the only American nation to have received a "massive shipment" of arms from an Iron Curtain country.

French Speed Wounded Lift From Fortress

Hope To End Task By Thursday Night

LUANG PRABANG, Indochina—The French hope to wind up their airlift of wounded out of shell-riddled Dien Bien Phu within the next three days.

The slow mercy shuttle hit a record high yesterday when 150 casualties—including the first batch of French officers and some Vietnamese—reached Luang Prabang. They were relayed by Dakotas to Hanoi's Lamson Hospital after first aid treatment.

That brought to 572 the total airlifted from the captured fortress so far. There are 313 yet to come out of the thick jungle of northwest Indochina. With good weather, Dulles expects to complete the operation by Thursday night.

Government Drops Case Against Accused Red

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department today dropped its prosecution of Val B. Lorwin, former State Department official, accused of lying when he denied Communist affiliations.

The government now forestalled a test on the power of a court to order production in a criminal trial of the secret records of a federal loyalty-security board hearing.

Reversal Puts Doctors Out Of Social Security

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee reversed itself today and decided against bringing an estimated 150,000 medical doctors and interns into the social security program.

The 15-10 vote reversing the doctors came on a motion by Rep. Jenkins (R-Ohio) as the committee started section-by-section final voting on provisions of a bill to broaden social security coverage and benefits. All the section previously had been approved tentatively.

Negroes Win New Rulings In Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—The District of Columbia Board of Education adopted 6 to 2 today a five-point blueprint for ending segregation of white and Negro children in Washington's public schools.

Plans before the school board, laid down by the superintendent of schools, call for a start on ending segregation next fall, with desegregation complete one year thereafter. The board recessed today until next Tuesday without a formal vote on the timing.

Boy Killed While Target Shooting

BALTIMORE (AP)—Edward Perro, 13-year-old high school student, was shot and killed yesterday while target shooting in a wooded area with his best friend.

George Allender, Perro's 18-year-old friend, ran from the woods to get help after the shot was nearly hysterical and had lost all sense of direction. Six policemen hunted for 30 minutes before locating Perro's body, which had rolled part way under a bush.
