McCarthy Charges Selected 'Most Important' Listed by Watkins

Arrest Comes 2 Hours After Robber Fleed

Identification Made By Company Clerk

Less than two hours after a young gunman held up a midtown finance company clerk and robbed him of \$232, police said they arrested the gunman and have positively identified him.

Detective Capt. W. A. McCall identified the gunman as Frank Davis, about 26 or 27 years of age. Davis was apprehended in the 500 block of W. Trade St. about 11:40, after the loan office was robbed early this morning.

Dale Loan Co. is located at 135 E. 4th St. in a block of loan and finance companies at which five holdups have occurred since last December.

Davis was arrested by Detectives L. W. Valentine and C. J. Dixon. Found on him was \$201.47. Clerk Frank Harlan Jr. has positively identified Davis, who lives in the 1700 block of South Blvd. as the holdup man. Detectives said the young white man had changed clothing after the robbery, purchasing a shirt, a pair of trousers and shoes with that of the stolen money.

So far Davis has denied any part in the armed robbery. He told detectives that he had cashed a check this morning at a local bank and detectives were attempting to break down his story by taking him to the midtown bank which he named.

The Dale Loan Co. clerk testified Davis as the gunman as soon as he was arrested. "That's the man, I'm sure," Mr. Harlan said. "I'm positive of it."

Officers said that Davis had changed into a new shirt and dark trousers which he said he purchased at a clothing store on E. Trade St. Officers believe that Davis changed from the clothes worn during the holdup, and are checking clothing stores to find the missing clothes and revolver.

The bandit, unmasked and brandishing a pistol, stuck up Manager Frank E. Harlan Jr. after asking for a loan application. Harlan was alone in the establishment located on the corner of E. Fourth and College Streets.

'Madame X' Testifies To Russian Atrocities

NEW YORK (AP) — A woman identified only as "Madame X" testifies from behind a screen before the House committee on the congressional committee how seven Russian soldiers ravished her in Hungary.

The woman, describing herself as Austrian-born, testified for about 35 minutes in excellent English before the house steering committee on Communist aggression, which is compiling reports on Red atrocities.

When she finished her story, she crumpled into the arms of her husband, standing directly in back of her in an anteroom doorway.

Reporters who caught a brief glimpse of her saw that she was a short, slender brunette, who appeared to be in her 30's. She wore a gray-green print dress, black pumps and dark sunglasses.

Beneath the screen, her hands could be seen clenching until the knuckles were white as she told of seven Russians coming to the farm where she and her husband were living in 1944.

Democrats Say Foreign Scene Hurts Congress

'Most Important' Listed by Watkins

WASHINGTON (AP)—A special Senate committee today announced five categories of charges on which it will start public hearings next Tuesday on the question of whether the Senate should censure Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), chairman of the bipartisan six-member committee, said the charges seemed to be "the most important" of 46 filed by three senators who have urged that McCarthy's conduct be officially condemned.

He emphasized, however, that these are not indictments of McCarthy from considering all the charges during the course of the public hearings, which will start Aug. 31, one day later than previously scheduled.

The five categories include: 1. Alleged "incident of contempt of the Senate or a senatorial committee" by McCarthy, centering largely around his failure to testify before a Senate elections subcommittee investigating his finances in 1950.

President Eisenhower centered on the at-home record in his broadening praise on Congress and hitting hard at opposition "propaganda of gloom and doom."

While Republicans joined in praising the administration's legislative accomplishments, Democrats, Sen. Russell of Georgia, Mansfield of Montana and Jackson of Washington said that the apparent collapse of the European Defense Community and what they called an unfavorable settlement in Indochina may claim the chief attention of American voters.

Leaves Message For His Enemies

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Brazil's old iron man, Getulio Vargas, sent a bullet through his heart and died in his palace today after 58 generals forced him to quit as president.

"To the wrath of my enemies I leave the legacy of my death," said a note left by the 71-year-old chief of the world's fourth largest country.

"I take the sorrow of not being able to give the humble all that I wish," Vargas stamped down and shot himself in his quarters at Catele Palace, the Brazilian White House.

Gen. Caetano de Castro, chief of his military staff, was with him. Police said Vargas suddenly whipped a pistol from his pocket and shot, dying almost immediately.

He thus fulfilled a promise he had made Sunday night—that he would leave office only under arrest or death. That was after 26 general officers of the air force, the navy and military academy.

The crisis that brought Vargas to power and death began Aug. 5 with the slaying of an air force major, Ruben Vaz, during an attempt to assassinate Carlos LaCorda, the anti-Vargas editor.
