



Hearing On Segregation Of Schools Set For Dec. 6

Top Court To Hear Further Arguments

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Supreme Court announced today that it will hear further arguments Dec. 6 on how to carry out segregation in public schools.

The arguments could extend several days. There will be an allowance of 10 hours for arguments from South Carolina, Virginia, Kansas, Delaware and the District of Columbia—directly involved in the cases which brought the court's antisegregation decision last May 17—and the replies to those arguments.

In addition, the Justice Department also may present one hour of argument, and seven states which were not directly involved in the May decision have notified the court they wish to appear as "friends of the court."

These states, which will file briefs and possibly take part in the oral arguments, are North Carolina, Arkansas, Texas, Florida, Maryland, Tennessee and Oklahoma. Attorneys general of these states wish to argue, they will be allowed one hour each.

Harold Willey, clerk, announced the court's action and said the justices had agreed that briefs may be filed by Nov. 15. Willey said that the week of Dec. 6 was the earliest available date for the arguments. The argument schedules for October and November had previously been filled.

The court opens its fall session Oct. 4.

The court in unanimously outlawing public school segregation last May called for further discussion this fall on how and when integration should take effect.

Continued Segregation Asked In N. C.

RALEIGH (AP)—A Pender County delegation today handed Gov. Unstead a petition signed by 4,377 persons calling for continued segregation of races in public schools.

The governor assured the group that officials are studying what action the state will take as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court decision abolishing segregation. "The ultimate action," he added, "lies with the General Assembly."

He reminded the delegation that "The problems are many and not of an easy solution."

The delegation of 18 persons was led by State Sen. J. V. Whitfield and Rep. Ashby Murphy. It included M. S. Ellis of Burgaw, chairman of the Pender County Board of Education, and County Commissioner J. F. Bradshaw.

Murphy said a group known as the Association for the Continuation of Segregation was formed last summer. "To ease the tension" resulting from the court's decision, he said leaders of the movement said "no intention of destroying friendly relations" between Negroes and whites. "To a certain extent," he added, Negro citizens of the county in Eastern North Carolina also favor continued segregation.

Lyons Corbett, Burgaw attorney who presented the petition, said 3,716 of the signers were white citizens of the county and 299 were Negro citizens. The remaining 352 were non-residents of the county who are interested in the matter, he said.

Corbett said 51 per cent of Pender County school children are Negroes.

Whitfield said Pender citizens feel the court's decision "can and will destroy both the Negro and the white races." He denounced the decision as "a step towards a mongrel race."

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U. N. Turns To Election Of Officials

Membership Bid For Red China Defeated

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The ninth U. N. General Assembly turned to election of seven vice presidents and seven committee chairmen this morning after an opening session which side-tracked the annual Communist bid to seat Red China.

Five of the vice presidencies under U. N. rules go to the "Big Five" permanent members of the Security Council — the United States, Britain, France, the Soviet Union and Nationalist China.

Burma and Ecuador were slated for the other two on a geographical rotation basis.

As expected before the session's opening, Dr. Ezeilo N. van Kieffens, Netherlands minister to Portugal, was elected Assembly president yesterday after the shelving of the Red China issue.

Leading candidates for the top committee posts were these: Political, Francisco Urrutia, Colombia; special political, Thorvald, Iceland; economic, Sir Douglas Copland, Australia; social, Jiri Nosek, Czechoslovakia; trusteeship, Rafik Asha, Syria; administrative, Pete Sarasin, Thailand; legal, Francisco Garcia Amador, Cuba.

With Van Kieffens, the 14 lesser Assembly officials make up the Steering Committee. They were to meet this afternoon to plan the session's work on the 67 items proposed for the international group's agenda.

The resolution putting off action on Russia's proposal to seat Red China was proposed yesterday by the United States. The Assembly adopted it 43-11. It was the third straight year the Assembly has taken such action.

Mrs. Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit of India, as outgoing Assembly president, called yesterday's session to order. She noted that and said she hoped the ninth Assembly would "promote the cause of peace."

Dr. Ezeilo N. van Kieffens, Netherlands minister to Portugal, introduced a resolution to have the Assembly say "it considers it necessary that the representative of the Chinese People's Republic, appointed by the Central People's Government, should take the right of seat of China in the General Assembly and in other organs of the United Nations."

Vishinsky held that the U. N. should seat the representative of the Chinese People's Republic.

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Methodists Start Session

Ministerial candidates were special guests at the brotherhood dinner.

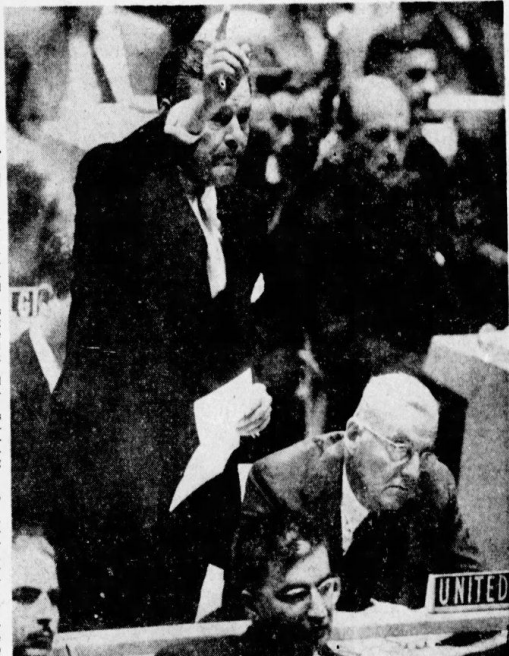
Today's program included a memorial service, conducted by Bishop Harrell.

S. C. State Senator, 4 Others Face Charge Of Buying Votes

SPRINGFIELD, S. C. — The Union County Grand Jury has recommended that State Sen. Bruce W. White and four others, one of them a member of the county's welfare board, be indicted on charges of election irregularities.

The grand jury's recommendations, charging that votes in the June 8 Democratic primary were bought for money, groceries and other promises of increased welfare checks, were contained in a presentment returned to Circuit Judge E. H. Henderson of Bamberg last night.

The presentment grew out of a case in which Gerald Roy Clay, a defeated candidate in the House of Representatives race, brought election irregularities charges against Clyde E. Sprouse, precinct chairman of Union's Ward 4, and L. Boyd Lee, a county welfare board member. The grand jury indicted the two this week.

In addition, officials aid the grand jury investigation of the alleged irregularities which were set forth in the presentment.

The recommendation for an indictment against White, who was defeated by former Rep. John D. Long, charges that "he allegedly conspired with Daniel Sherbert and L. B. Lee to violate the election laws by attempting to exert undue influence on C. C. Cutshaw and Martha Cutshaw in an effort to influence their vote in his alleged irregularities which were set forth in the presentment."

Also recommended for indictment were Sherbert, Harry V. Arthur, a mill worker, and the Cutshaws.

The allegation against Sherbert said "he did pay to C. C. Cutshaw and Martha Cutshaw the sum of one dollar each in an effort to exert undue influence on C. C. Cutshaw and Martha Cutshaw in an effort to influence their vote in his alleged irregularities which were set forth in the presentment."

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Body Found Over Year Ago

Arrest Of Two Reopens Roman Girl's Death Case

ROME (AP)—The sex and dope scandal of Wilma Montesi's death exploded again last night with the arrests of Piero Piccioni, son of Italy's former foreign minister, and a self-styled Marquis Quo Montagna.

The case, involving lurid allegations of drug and sex orgies at a dined by prominent Italians, has rocked official Rome and threatened Premier Mario Scelba's government.

Piero's father, Attilio Piccioni, resigned his Cabinet post last Saturday to help in his son's defense.

The younger Piccioni, 22, is charged with aggravated manslaughter in connection with the death of the shapely 21-year-old party girl, whose nearly nude body was found on a beach at Ostia, near Rome, a year ago last April.

Montagna is accused of aiding and abetting. Both men were held in Rome's Regina Coeli (Queen of Heaven) prison. They have repeatedly denied any connection with Wilma's death.

The Italian News Agency ANSA also reported that an attempt to arrest two guards at Montagna's luxurious Ostia estate where Miss Montagna came 12 days after Dr. Raffaele Sepe, an official of Rome's Court of Appeals who has been called exercise of authority and of the use of the staff to be used in "aiding Piero Piccioni in avoiding guards also was taken into custody. Charges against the three have not yet been disclosed.

Police two weeks ago arrested not only the guards but also the two men.

Attlee Would 'Get Rid' Of Chiang

LONDON — Labor leader Clement Attlee, returning from a tour behind the iron and hammer curtains, said today he believes "the sooner we get rid of Chiang Kai-shek and his troops the better it will be."

The former prime minister told reporters at London airport the Orient following the Indo-China truce agreement at Geneva.

He declined comment on the United Nations General Assembly's decision yesterday against considering switching China's representation in the U. N. from the Chinese Nationalists to the Communists and postponing debate on the issue for another year.

Attlee led a Labor Party delegation which visited Moscow and Peking and took a fairly extensive tour through Communist China. Other members of the party, including left-winger Aneurin Bevan, returned to London earlier.

Attlee made a visit to Australia and New Zealand and then home across the Pacific and the North American continent. He and Mrs. Attlee, who joined him in Singapore, were greeted at the airport by their two daughters and a grandchild.

But no top brass of the Labor Party turned up at the announcement. The party's national executive committee is preparing for the annual party conference next week at Scarborough — was wrangling over the issue of West German rearmament at the moment Attlee's plane touched down.

Attlee himself was expected to get into this discussion later in the day.

"After all," he said, "when you stop to think, there's not too much difference in calling hogs and calling husbands."

Lecturer On Communism Held In Crime Series

PILOT MOUNTAIN — (AP) — Joe Reynolds, 28-year-old Negro lecturer on Communism who allegedly tried to kill Police Chief S. D. Patton here, has been linked with a Saturday night hold-up in Weldon, Chief Patton said today.

The Weldon gunman entered a hotel, took \$55 from the clerk and an \$85 Hamilton watch from a hotel guest, Chief Patton said.

Halifax Sheriff Harry House said an intruder went to a residence, held a pistol on the occupant and lectured on Communism and race relations, forced a taxi driver to take him to Enfield and escaped from police there in a hail of gunfire.

Pilot Mountain Chief Patton said the Negro forced his way into the police car at gunpoint and shot at him twice at close quarters as he wrestled with him.

The Pilot Mountain chief, quickly investigating a report that the Negro might be wanted in Eastern North Carolina, said Reynolds had a Hamilton watch which met the description of the one stolen at Weldon.

He said he was told that Reynolds also would face a charge of attempted rape in the Eastern Carolina county.

But he first faces four capital charges in Surry County. A Surry grand jury yesterday indicted him on four cases of first degree burglary for robbing Mount Airy homes while the residents slept, Chief Patton said.

He also is charged with kidnapping and assault with intent to kill in connection with the hold-up of the police chief.

Plane Crashes On Takeoff; All Safe

STANFORD, England (AP) — A four-engine transport with 45 British soldiers and a crew of 5 aboard crashed and caught fire on takeoff today. Everyone scrambled out safely with only a second or two to spare.

The aircraft was a privately operated transport under charter to the War Office. The troops were en route to Fayid in the Suez Canal Zone.
