The 3rd Challenge: Ike Faces Full Test Of Power

FOUR years ago, when a solemn, inexperienced and rather nervous Dwight Eisenhower had just taken the oath of office for the first time, this reporter and his partner pointed to three "tremendous challenges" which confronted the new President.

Those were the days when the President was so often frustrated by his own party that he talked seriously of forming a third party. After 20 years in the wilderness, many Republicans had formed the habit of looking on the occupant of the White House as their natural enemy, and the

thought of accepting the President's political or ideological leadership hardly occurred to them. Hardly the difference now. Sen. McCarthy is sunk without trace, and there is no one else in the Republican Party who would think for a minute of seriously challenging President Eisenhower.

As for the President's willingness to use his authority, it is only necessary to consider the "Eisenhower Doctrine." The President has started his second term by demanding of the Congress a blanket grant of authority such as Franklin Roosevelt, at the height of his power, would never have dared ask.
