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Atlanta Buses Seating Law Challenged

ATLANTA (AP) — Negro ministers today began a "love law and liberation movement" to end racial seating barriers on buses at this Georgia capital, a stronghold of segregation. The plan was given its name last night at a mass meeting at the Big Wheat Street Baptist Church where it was perfected. The first step was delegated to some 100 Negro pastors and the wife of one of the leaders said it began as scheduled around 10 a. m. At the designated hour, many of the city buses normally are filled with Negroes and if a desegregation gesture was made on one of these it would hardly be noticed. The ministers agreed to start out from their individual homes "and take seats heretofore reserved for white only," tempering their action with prayer, courtesy and non-violence. Mrs. William Holmes Borders, wife of the pastor of the Wheat St. church and chairman of the desegregation move, said he boarded a bus near his home at the scheduled hour and that others did the same. Instructions to the preachers were similar to those issued in Montgomery, Ala., just before segregation ended on the buses there. Desegregation moves also have been launched in Birmingham, Ala., and Tallahassee, Fla. Sporadic violence occurred in all three of these cities. The Atlanta City attorney, Jack Savage, said bus segregation is decreed by Georgia state law which requires municipal authorities to enforce it. The law, he said, also gives bus operators police powers of enforcement.



Suitor Kills Co-Ed, Takes His Own Life

VERMILLION, S. D. (AP) — A University of South Dakota co-ed and her former fiance were dead today after authorities said he shot her and then himself at her home here last night. Jeanne Bruyer, 21, a drum major and campus beauty candidate, was shot fatally by Donald Steele, 20, a sophomore at the university. Clay County state's attorney Theodore Delney said Steele, son of Dr. D. S. Steele, Robbinsdale, Minn., veterinarian, died early today at a Sioux City, Iowa, hospital. He had shot himself in the right temple. Miss Bruyer and Steele were engaged to be married until a month ago when she broke off the engagement. The Bruyer family priest said Steele had roomed at the Bruyer house until just before Christmas. The priest said Steele had "mistreated" Miss Bruyer. He did not elaborate. Howard Conners, University dean of men, said Steele, a 1954 graduate of Atlantic City, N. J., High School, had an "emotional problem" and had been advised to go home before Christmas. Mrs. Evelyn Bruyer said Steele had telephoned her daughter four times yesterday, then went to the Bruyer house about noon. Mrs. Bruyer said she told the young man he could see Jeanne once more if he promised not "to bother her any more." Mrs. Bruyer said she was in an adjoining room when she heard her daughter ask Steele last night, "Where did you get that gun?" Before she could act, she said, the shots were fired. Dr. E. J. Moore said Miss Bruyer was shot three times by a .22 caliber pistol. He said one bullet struck her in the head and severed the respiratory nerve at the base of the skull.

Middle East Resolution Retarded

WASHINGTON (AP) Rep. Gordon (D-Ill.) said today "developments at the last moment" are causing a slowdown in House Foreign Affairs Committee action on the Eisenhower Middle East resolution. Gordon, the committee chairman, indicated hearings on the resolution may last through next week. That would be a week later than he previously planned. "Too many people are asking to testify," he said. But Gordon said it is still possible that the House will pass the resolution by the end of January, a target date Secretary of State Dulles expressed hope for after a closed session with the committee yesterday. Eisenhower has asked a four-point program including authority to use U. S. troops if necessary to help defend against Communist aggression any Middle Eastern nation which asks help. Military and economic aid to the area also would be authorized. One-sentence MEASUREMENT Measurment it was learned that a one-sentence substitute resolution omitting any mention of economic aid is being circulated among the committee's Democratic members. The substitute says only: "The United States regards as vital to the independence and integrity of the states of the Middle East, and, if necessary, will use her armed forces to that end." Speaker of the House Rayburn (D-Tex.), commenting that "it makes sense," said the substitute was set forth by "a prominent American" who he declined to identify further. He did not indicate whether the committee might take it on. One Democratic member of the committee said "there is going to be no economic aid to that area," but others said the proposals could be worked out later in separate legislation.

MADE CLEAR Two committee members said Dulles and Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, made clear during recent testimony yesterday that the administration was not planning to publicly list which countries would come under the resolution. Representatives Zablocki (D-Wis.) and Vorse (R-Ohio) said the lists and Vorse defined roughly the countries to be affected, but indicated a belief that a public listing would be ineffective in dampening any Communist plans to attack elsewhere. Press and cons reverberated over Rep. Wayne Hays' (D-Ohio) one-man walkout at the start of the committee session in Dulles yesterday. Hays protested closed hearings which, he said, exempted Dulles from answering embarrassing questions publicly but bound the congressmen to secrecy on what Dulles said. V. M. Newton Jr., managing editor of the Tampa Tribune and chairman of the Freedom of Information Committee of Sigma Delta Chi, a professional journalism fraternity, wired congratulations to Hays.

Beating Trial Scene Shift Is Rumored

Rumors have also had that attorneys may ask that the trial be moved from the county for a "fair" trial because sentiment so strongly favors the accused men that a fair trial would not be possible in the county. Rumors have had venire coming from another county to hear the case. However, Solicitor T. Post Taylor of Columbia told The News today he has "faith" in the people of Kershaw County and "I feel they will help in giving us a fair trial. I have full faith in these people and I do not like the impression that these are unlawful people we have in the county." But the solicitor or the defense could however, ask that the trial be held in a county other than Kershaw.

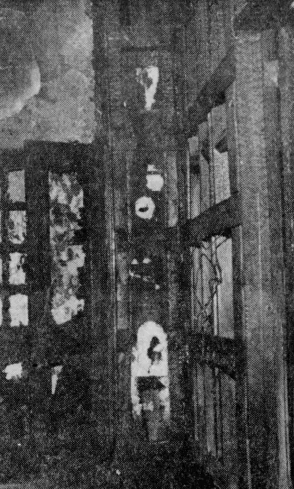
Board Calls For Quick Repair Job

Egypt Plans To Place Suez Canal Dispute Before U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Egypt appeared planning today to put the Suez Canal dispute before the 14-nation U. N. General Assembly, where large blocs of countries support the Egyptian claim to sole control of the waterway. Such a move was indicated by Abdul Kader Hatem, Egyptian information director, who declared his country will not negotiate directly or indirectly with France and Britain on the future control of the canal. "Egypt can only discuss the matter within the framework of the United Nations," Hatem said in a statement in Cairo. 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HOLIDAY SHORT ONE FOR PUPILS

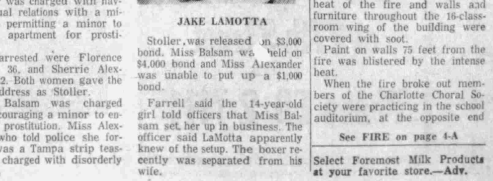

ANDREWS (AP) — A hearing scheduled in Recorder's Court here Monday for a 25-year-old Andrews man who told police he accidentally shot his father dead with a shotgun blast aimed at a love rival. Sheriff Claude Anderson said yesterday Kenneth Crawford admitted the slaying of Pearl Crawford, 60, and was held in the Cherokee County jail at Murphy on a first-degree murder charge. Also scheduled to appear in court Monday, said the sheriff, are James Hays, 27, brother of the accused; Mrs. Mary Stevens, 23; Walter Hicks, and Bob White, 23, all of Andrews. Anderson reported that Kenneth Crawford said he let the group, who were having a party at Lionel Crawford's one-room home, about 4 a. m. yesterday. Bringing back his shotgun, Anderson quoted Crawford, he aimed it and fired at White out of jealousy, but the charge hit Crawford's father, who was stoking a wood stove about four or five feet from a sofa where White was seated.

Former Champ LaMotta Held On Morals Charge

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Jake LaMotta, former world middleweight boxing champion, two women and another man were arrested today on various charges involving a 14-year-old girl. The 34-year-old LaMotta was charged with maintaining a "house of prostitution" and engaging in prostitution, and permitting a minor to use her services.
