## Local Lawmakers Want More Salary Boost For Teachers

**SPECIAL TO THE NEWS**  
**RALEIGH** — The Mecklenburg delegation to the General Assembly voiced itself in favor of higher teacher pay today — higher than recommended by the Advisory Budget Commission.  
"But, at the same time, members of the delegation worry about where the additional money is coming from."  
Reps. Jack D. Love, Frank Sneyd and Ernest L. Hicks told The News they favored increases of more than the 9.1 per cent recommended by the Budget Bureau.

**NOT REPORTED**  
Rep. James B. Vogler was out of town and Sen. Spencer Bell has not reported for work in the Senate.  
The Budget Bureau recommended a 9.1 per cent increase and further recommended a "merit system" for passing out the increases.  
Rep. Sneyd, a freshman member of the delegation, said today that he favors an increase greater than 9 per cent.  
"I have not come up with any particular percentage figure," he said, "because we don't know how much money we can get."  
The 20 per cent figure which has been mentioned sounds good — any increase sounds good — but it is a matter of where the money is going to get the money. We've got to find new sources of revenue to tap. It is going to mean cutting something out of the budget or some new tax."  
Sneyd noted that the suggested tax on foods probably would get little consideration.  
He also said the "merit system" for allocating teacher pay

increases will also get little consideration because "nobody's got a merit plan."  
"Theoretically it sounds like a fine thing, but so far where is the money?" he asked.

**NOT ENOUGH**  
Rep. Hicks said the nine per cent recommended increase, "is not quite enough."  
"I agree that the big question is, of course, the source of the

additional money," he said.  
Hicks also scored the proposed merit system.  
"I don't see a way we can evaluate teacher's work efficiently and effectively. It is a good idea, but there is no workable plan at this time," he said.

Rep. Love was the co-sponsor of a bill tossed into the hopper this week calling for a 20 per cent teacher pay increase as opposed to the 9.1 per cent recommended by the Budget Bureau.

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## Reds Begin Crackdown In Hungary

**BUDAPEST** (AP)—More than 30 new arrests growing out of the anti-Russian revolt in Hungary were announced today. There apparently were a considerable number of others not listed in public announcements.  
A group of 13 awaiting trial at the little town of Nagykata, about 35 miles east of Budapest, were charged with destroying Communist party headquarters and the Soviet War Memorial there.  
The trade union newspaper Neparakt reported two men picked up in Budapest had confessed planning to kill local Communist leaders. A teacher was reported arrested in Budapest for hiding leaflets in his apartment.  
The official ATU News Agency reported a number of arrests not carried in the newspaper.  
Premier Janos Kadar's Soviet-installed government apparently had completed taking over the association of Hungarian University students. This body was formed on the eve of the October revolt and played a big part in it.  
The government announced that the association had decided to join the World Federation of Democratic Youth, a Communist-controlled organization, and to take part in a youth festival at Moscow later this year.

## Private Shops

Kadar's cabinet promised it would enlarge the field open to small private shops "in those fields where Socialist small trade has shown itself defective and where it is necessary to give the people a better supply of goods." No other details were given.  
The interior ministry denied a report that anti-Communist rebels still control the town of Tomoerokeny near the Yugoslav border.  
"Nepeskozhogok," Hungary's official Communist party newspaper, said yesterday the town of 5,000 persons was an exceptionally strong mainstay of the anti-Soviet revolt and the "forces of counter-revolution are still holding their positions."  
Tomoerokeny's mayor, reached by telephone, also denied any rebels were holding out there.

A Bessemer City man, who said he was on his way to see the State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, led three police cars and an off-duty policeman on a high-speed chase before he was stopped at gunpoint this morning.  
Police picked up the trail of Norman E. Ross, a 37-year-old construction worker, about 10 a.m. at McDowell St. and Independence Blvd.  
Officers J. B. Clark and M. G. Stubbs reported the speeder refused to heed their siren and headed eastward along the heavily-traveled boulevard.  
At Memorial Stadium, officers J. D. Norman and J. D. Sanders joined the other city police car.  
Following the two city policemen, off-duty county patrolman Elmer Lantz gave chase in his own auto.

## Fakers Unmasked

**Demara (Center) Being Questioned by Maine Officials.**  
The Municipal Court warrant, which accused DeMara of misrepresentation in getting the teacher's certificate by falsely claiming he attended Wagner College on Staten Island, N.Y.  
DeMara was held overnight at his own request. The desk officer said he had received telephone calls, all expressing sympathy for DeMara, from Texas, Florida, California, New York and Canada during the night.  
One call, the officer said, was from the warden of Huntsville, Tex. State Prison, where DeMara once was lieutenant of the guard. The warden offered to help DeMara in any way possible.  
The charge stemmed from his role as Martin Bennett Goddard, an instructor of "superior qualifications" who taught North Haven youngsters English, Latin and French, instituted recreational programs, organized a Sea Scout unit and won praise from his colleagues, superiors and the island population.

## No. One: A Teacher...

**AUGUSTA, Maine** (AP)—An instructor who has posed as a Canadian surgeon in Kansas, among other roles, pleaded guilty today to a charge of cheating by false pretenses in getting a Maine island teaching job.  
Ferdinand Waldo DeMara Jr., 34, a native of Lawrence, Mass., was ordered held for Superior Court, County Atty. Robert A. Marden said DeMara told him he wished to have his case disposed of quickly and would waive grand jury action.

## ... No. Two: A Preacher

**ELMDALE, Kan.** (AP)—What kind of a man is Calvin Laskey, who masqueraded as minister and war hero melted away to expose a 29-year career of thievery, Army desertion and jail breaking under 20 names?  
"He has a genuine humanitarian drive — he wants to do good for people," says William Pringle, county attorney who prosecuted Laskey last Monday on a charge of illegally marrying a girl while serving a prison term for 26 convictions.  
He loves to read. He sews and crochets. And 26 times he has been convicted of crimes that are penitentiary offenses.  
"He was publicity crazy," says Mrs. Richard Lutz, co-owner of the Chase County Leader-News. "He admits he's been in a lot of trouble. He said he lied in the past. He said he had to be kept over his record. Each time he laid the cards on the table for a prospective employer he was unbearable and he used aliases."  
"Now, he says, he's glad it's all out. In the future he will tell the truth."  
Pringle said Laskey had a number of color photographs of fires that he had been present at a number of fires in this area but he denies having anything to do with them. Pringle repeated that Laskey was never in Korea.  
**CRADLED IN COLLEGE**  
Laskey, a Canadian, managed to enroll as a freshman at Park College at Parkville, Mo., in the fall of 1953 under the name Dean Barton. He used that name later.

## Restaurant Wrecked In Clinton

**CLINTON, Tenn.** (AP)—A dynamite-laden suitcase exploded in the heart of Clinton's Negro section last night, wrecking a restaurant and slightly injuring a Negro woman and baby.  
The dynamite charge, which witnesses said was placed by a white man who raced away in a car, also heavily damaged other Negro-owned property.  
The blast was the area's eighth, and by far the most destructive, since Clinton High School admitted 12 Negro students under a federal court order last fall.  
In the absence of concrete clues, however, officers still declined to speculate as to whether integration of the previously all-white school is connected with the explosions.  
Police said the suitcase, which contained "several" sticks of dynamite, was placed on a concrete slab across the street from a restaurant where several Negroes were eating. The Negroes said they saw a white man stop, leave the suitcase, jump back into his car and speed away.  
**WALLS, CEILING**  
The blast caved in the ceiling and inner walls of the basement restaurant.  
The woman, identified as Emma Simmons, suffered a laceration on the head when hit by falling plaster. The 11-month-old girl, Jacqueline Gallagher, was cut by flying glass.  
Neither was believed seriously hurt.  
Also damaged was a nearby sandwich shop owned by Steve Williams, father of a 21-year-old senior suspended from the integrated school on grounds he struck a white boy and threatened others with a knife Feb. 4.  
Two cars owned by Negroes were damaged.

## Burned Plane Lands Safely

**SAVANNAH, Ga.** (AP)—A B7 bomber landed safely at Hunter Air Force Base today after crewmen put out flames in the tail section. One man who had baled out in the Atlantic was picked up.  
The bomber, on a training flight from Hunter, caught fire some 180 miles east of Savannah and the crew decided to ditch. After one man parachuted out the pilot discovered another member of the crew was unconscious from lack of oxygen and he headed the plane for Savannah.  
Four men were aboard. Capt. Charles E. Steward, an observer on the flight, bailed out before the plane turned back. The Navy reported he was picked up by a merchant ship.  
Others on the flight were Capt. James L. Pentz Jr., Capt. John F. Nielson, the pilot, and Lt. Alfred A. Ramey Jr. Ramey passed out from lack of oxygen but recovered shortly before the plane landed.
