If You're 40 And Toothless You Have Lots Of Company

"One of five Americans has lost all his teeth by the time he's 40 years old," said Dr. J. Lewis Blass, professor in New York University's School of Dentistry.

By the time he's 50, two of five Americans have lost all their teeth — and it goes up. Three of five by 60, and three out of four by age 70. And that's all their teeth, not just some of them."

What to do about it? That's what a dentist is for.

Dr. Blass, in town to speak to the meeting last night of the Charlotte Dental Society, said, "You don't have to lose your teeth by a certain age. It isn't right to accept the limiting notions of only 20 years ago, even."

WHAT TO DO

"A plate—no matter how well it's fitted — detracts," he said. "The surest way to make a beautiful matron of 40 look old is to give her a plate."

Rapidly ticking them off one by one, Dr. Blass recommended some of the things your dentist can do for you — if you'll let him.

"At the age of two or three, he can examine a child to be sure there are no hereditary defects in his mouth. He can correct defects discovered before they cause real trouble. He can teach the child that he's 'doctor dentist' not 'demon dentist.'"

"He can teach you how to brush your teeth."

And he broke into his recounting to praise Charlotte for the fluoridation of its city water supply — "You're using modern science to its fullest."

Then he continued, "He can take off slight defects — like a pit cavity, where the tooth enamel doesn't meet completely — early, when there is little cost and no discomfort."

"Notice I didn't say 'pain' no discomfort, even."

Out of the realm, now, of fillings and tooth brushes, and into the field of prevention of tooth trouble, Dr. Blass went on.

"A dentist will discuss nutrition with his patient. You know, roughage in the diet is impor-

tant to your teeth, as well as vitamins, minerals, proteins, carbohydrates, and so forth.

"If the diet is too soft, or has too many sweets, it will cause decay. Finish a meal with fruit and you'll clean your teeth of debris."

Another thing — the tensions of everyday living impose stresses that can show up in the mouth. You know the expression, "grit your teeth and go on." Gritting them may hurt your teeth.

And in the field of general health, your dentist can help, Dr. Blass said.

"A set jaw" can cause complications," he said. "And it may mean general strain. The beginning of complete relaxation is to relax the jaw, and that begins with correct posture."

GENERAL HEALTH

"The dentist, too, can call matters pertaining to general health to the attention of your physician. Some conditions — chronic infection, for instance — may show up in the mouth first, before any other symptoms are visible."

Summing it all up, Dr. Blass said, "We don't do what's good for us — we smoke too much, we eat too much."

"But at least once a year — preferably more often — you ought to see your dentist for a complete dental examination. Just find out 'How I'm doing!'"
