Brewster Vague On Union Account

(Continued From Page 1) There are no records of expenditures from the "special account," Kennedy said. The "special account" was a matter of a Seattle bank cashing checks and issuing cashier checks in the same amounts to Brewster and O'Reilly. Kennedy said one such check was in the amount of \$4,000. He said it was spent as a down payment on a new home for Brewster and his wife at the Palm Springs Desert Properties Corp., Palm Springs.

"DON'T RECALL" "I don't recall this transaction at the present time," Brewster said. "I'm going to have to refresh my memory."

Brewster promised, as he has for all other union expenditures the committee has questioned, that he would try to get more data for the committee.

But he said he had no explanation other than a general feeling the money all went for political contributions of the \$100,000 stipulated through the Local 17 "special account."

"None of that money was spent to pay my personal bills," Brewster declared adding: "Not that I can remember anyway."

Kennedy confronted Brewster with a series of checks, hotel vouchers and union records. Kennedy said that among other things they showed union funds were spent for lodgings for Brewster's race horse jockey, Richard Cavallero, his trainer, Mel Eisen, and a union organizer named Terry McNulty.

MOTEL RECORDS This came from records of the El Rancho Motel at Milbrae, Calif., a spot Kennedy said was two miles from the Tufanur race track and four miles from Bay Meadows track.

Brewster said he stayed there because it was cheaper than to stay at San Francisco hotel and also because the Teamsters had a local union there he had to check in with.

Brewster said while McNulty "aren't you being discriminated against?" the senator asked Brewster.

"Please don't get into Mr. Beck now," Brewster pleaded. "I've got enough trouble now."

The testimony marked the start of the fourth week and 13th day of public hearings by the committee. In advance of the session, Kennedy told reporters that the questioning of Brewster might have a "vital" bearing on a later inquiry involving Beck.

Wise Expected to Take Seat on Council April 8 as Truax Submits Resignation

Paving the way for the city's paving of Ray Wise on the city council of directors, Fourth Ward Councilman Archie Truax has submitted his resignation effective "not later than March 31."

The other councilmen accepted Truax' resignation "with regret" Monday night. Truax had said he intended to give up his city position after the election and during his full time to being a county commissioner. The April 8 meeting will wait until the Council meets and three to three-year terms, starting June 1.

The council, tearing through a variety of city business, gave first and second reading to an ordinance setting up a Board of Councilors, proposed by Councilman John Dimco. Then they sent it to committee of the whole.

The measure would create a council board, with authority to appoint or remove any of the nine members appointed by the mayor and subject to council confirmation. The present board has no status by ordinance or charter.

Members of the proposed board would be appointed to three-year terms, except the first board would have three appointees to one-year terms, three to two-year terms, and three to three-year terms, starting June 1.

It would require that three of the members be employees of the city. The measure would create a Board of Councilors, proposed by Councilman John Dimco. Then they sent it to committee of the whole.

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Lynden to Study School Sites

Long range planning for expansion of Lynden school facilities was discussed Monday night, at a public meeting in Lynden High School.

Some 60 persons heard Alfred P. Brandt, member of the school board, outline some of the problems that will face the district within the next 10 years.

The problem includes an increase of school population and procurement of building sites. Present buildings are adequate for the next four or five years. However, past experience has shown that the increase in school population of 3 per cent is probable.

TO STUDY SITES He said that studies by outside groups indicate that the increase will be greater. He didn't present figures because further studies are being made in this area.

The group discussed the problem of finding a site or sites for new buildings. Consideration was given to the possibility that sites available today may not be available in a few years because of the increase in home construction.

Types of buildings, remodeling of the present facilities and financing were other topics.

A number of the persons present expressed willingness to serve on an advisory committee to help the school board approach solution to the problems.

Such a committee will be named by the board soon, according to Elbert Isom, superintendent of schools.

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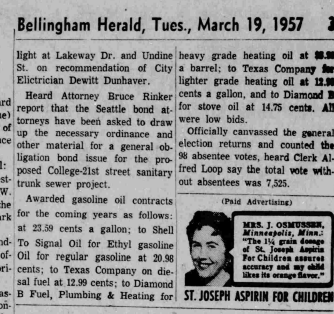
