Only 14 Of 103 Are Sure They'll Stick

The 14 were among 103 of 174 city-county male teachers who answered a detailed questionnaire this week

week

And the reason they hope to leave the profession
is summed up in one word "Money."

The questionnaire was sent out by the Myers
Park Schoolmasters' Club preceding a called meeting
for all city-county male teachers Tuesday.

Won't Boost Profession

The answers also revealed other significant facts about the attitude of the male teacher here: Considering present tenure and salary, an overwhelming majority of male teachers said they would not recommend the profession in North Carolina to young men starting college.

If the male teacher had it to do all over again, he would not choose the teaching profession.

Where they have the teachers felt — because of pre-occupation with financial responsibilities, uncertainties, etc. — they were not doing a good job.

Nearly all the male teachers hold other jobs, some having as many as six outside the classroom.

Nearly all the male teachers cannot live on their teacher pay alone.

The Myers Park group is headed by Gus Purcell, a Myers Park High School teacher and coach. Other officers are vice president Fred Sitton and secretary-treasurer Julian Helms.

Male teachers have been asked to attend a meeting in the Myers Park High School library Tuesday at 4 o'clock to "discuss the current teacher situation and how the male teacher fits into the picture," Purcell said.

50 Serious About Leaving

(It is significant, however, that only 14 of the 103 answering these two questions answered "no" to both questions, indicating only 14 male teachers are certain they will remain in the profession here.) the profession here.)

Biggest Complaint: Money

The reason given by practically all the teachers for their unhappiness was "Financial." A few complained about parents, administrative details, hours, etc.

One question read: "If suddenly your family were dependent solely on your teaching salary, could you in fairness
to them remain in the teaching profession?"

One of the summer of the salary could be summer.

Out of 103 answers, only 12 said they could remain, 68 said they could not and 23 were undecided.

A question on outside work showed nearly all worked at at least one outside-the-classroom position. Some worked at as many as six, they said. Some of these multiple jobs, however, entail coaching duties for some male teachers who are paid extra for that. Others work on Saturdays and many during holidays. Thirty-nime of the teachers said they had one outside position. It hold two positions and 16 hold from four to six.

Not Doing Effective Job

Financial worries and other uncertainties, including out-side obligations, the teachers said, cut down on their effec-tiveness in the classroom. Consequently, 56 of 100 answering the question said they were not contributing "maximum effec-tiveness to the education of pupils" in their classroom. Twen-ty-two said they left they were and 22 were undecided.
