Thirty-three members of the Missionary Volunteer Society of First Seventh-day Adventist Church will receive honor badges tonight.

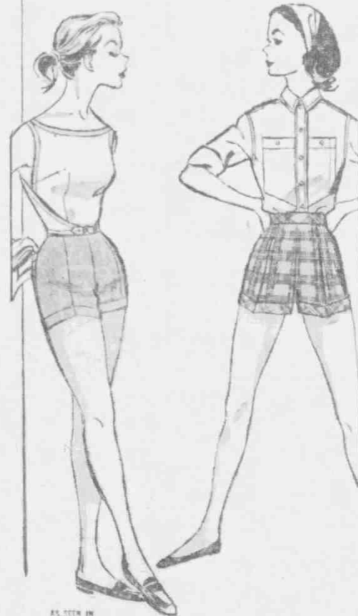
Course Attended

WHITE and NEGRO Patients To Be MIXED At MEMORIAL HOSPITAL!

Here Are The Facts:

As you have probably heard, Charlotte voters are being asked to approve a bond issue on May 7th which will be used for the expansion of Memorial Hospital. You probably have not heard that if this bond issue is approved and the expansion of Memorial Hospital takes place, the hospital will be open to white and Negro patients alike. Mr. R. Z. Thomas, Jr., Administrator of Memorial Hospital, was quoted by the "Charlotte News" as saying:

"BUT WE DO PROPOSE TO VERY AFFIRMATIVELY ANSWER THE STATEMENT THAT THEY [the facilities of Memorial Hospital] WILL BE MADE (OPEN) TO WHITE AND COLORED PEOPLE." The "Charlotte Observer" in an article recently had this to say:

"THE HOSPITAL WILL ADMIT NEGRO PATIENTS FOR THE FIRST TIME AFTER THE ENLARGEMENT."

Many people will go to the polls on May 7 and vote in favor of this bond issue not knowing that they are voting to integrate Memorial Hospital. And apparently there is no need for this as Dr. R. B. McKnight was quoted in the "Observer" as saying that there was a waiting list at every Charlotte hospital EXCEPT Good Samaritan. If this is the case why allow colored into the Memorial Hospital?
