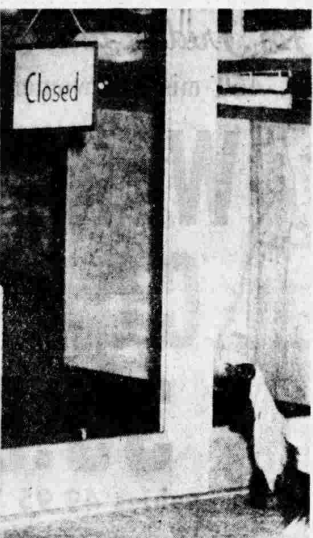

**Graham To Speak On 'Youth Aflame'**

An overflow "Youth Night" crowd is expected at the coliseum tonight to hear Dr. Billy Graham speak on "Youth Aflame."  
Mr. Graham said tonight's service will be one of the most important he has preached. "I want you to help me get every person under 25 years old in Charlotte out to hear this," Dr. Graham told a near capacity crowd at the coliseum last night.

Last night's 12,500 persons listened to the internationally known evangelist preach on "Heaven and Hell." At the end of the service 317 persons came forward to make "decisions for Christ."  
Total attendance for the crusade thus far now stands at 306,490, and 11,773 persons have come forward in the 22 services.  
Dr. Graham took his text last night from Job 14:14: "If a man die, shall he live again?"  
"Most everybody," Billy said, "has wondered at times about life after death and you have asked yourself the question many times—'If I were to die today, what would happen?'"

### OLD AND NEW

"The Bible teaches in both the Old and New Testament that there is a life after death. The Bible clearly teaches it."  
"Nobody can pick up the Bible and fill with the teachings concerning life after death. Nobody can study the teachings of Jesus without realizing that He believed and taught life after death."

Dr. Graham told the crowd that everyone has to make up his mind about Jesus, one way or the other.  
"Jesus said in John 14:2 and 3, 'I go to prepare a place for you and if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you into myself.'"  
"Jesus said it. Was Jesus a liar?"  
If you want to say that Jesus was a liar, all right. If He is a liar on this point, then He is a liar on a dozen and a quick ought to be dispensed with and forgotten.

"You have got to make up your mind about Jesus. Either He was

## 108 Units, Restaurant Planned

A new million-dollar motel to contain 108 units will be erected at N. Tryon St. and Craighard Rd. about three miles from Independence Square.

E. A. Byrum, vice president and E. L. Vinson, president of the Vinson Realty Co., announced plans for the motel this morning. Ground will be broken on or before Dec. 1, it is said.

The motel will be built by the Roanoke-Charlotte Motel Co. Inc., a North Carolina corporation. Financing of the project was handled by the Vinson Mortgage Co. here.  
Jed and Adolph Krusch, brothers of Roanoke, Va., operate the company and came here today to settle final details with Mr. Byrum and the Vinson Mortgage Co. They also operate the Holiday Inn in Roanoke and the new Holiday Inn opening Saturday in Salisbury.

The motel units will be built around a courtyard to contain a swimming pool and landscaped recreation areas for adults and children.  
ENCLOSED POOL

The swimming pool will be enclosed so guests may use it in summer and winter, and will have a large dining tower.  
The motel will have two large meeting and banquet rooms each to accommodate 125 persons, as well as a restaurant to accommodate 300 persons.

The Krusch brothers said the motel will be the finest in the Carolinas, and will have a large and luxurious lobby.  
Operator of the restaurant has not been selected yet, but several nationally known concerns have applied for the franchise, they said.

Each motel room will be 12 by 24 feet in size and will have a dressing room, bath and television set. Each room will have a built-in television antenna will be erected to give guests choice of several stations.  
The motel will have a tinted aluminum and glass front so that the front wall of each room will be to glass. Each room will also have a paneled door, the other two to be of masonry.  
The motel itself will be of brick, glass and aluminum construction, and will be fireproof.

### EXPANSION ALLOWED

It will be erected to permit expansion to 200 rooms if needed, the Krusch brothers said.  
Parking will be on a "perimeter" of the outer walls of the building, this will keep the courtyard clear and make it more attractive to guests, the builders said.

The motel will front on N. Tryon St. The land on which it will be built was bought in 1954 from the Highland Hotel Co. of Charlotte.

## Census Clock On 'Time' Of 175 Million

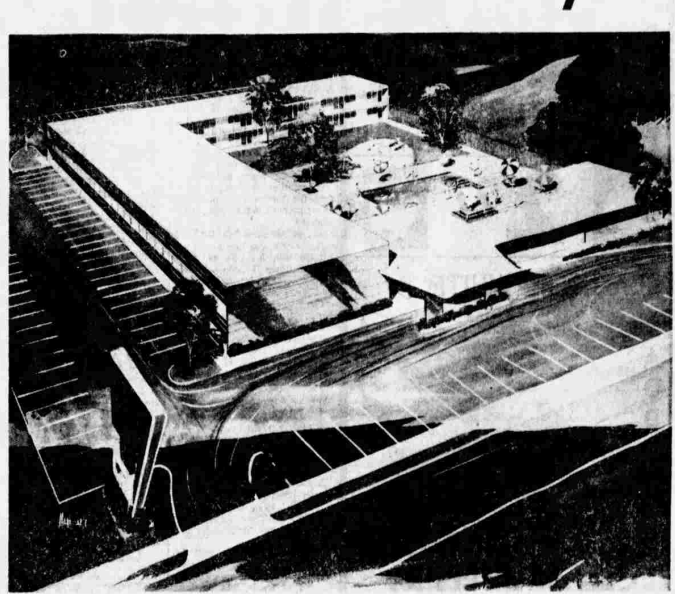
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Nation's population reached 175 million at 11:08 a. m. (EDT) today, by the estimate of the Commerce Department's census clock.  
The digits on the speedometer-like counter turned over with a clanking of cams and plungers before a small crowd attracted by a goody train of motion picture and still photographers.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks and Robert W. Burgess, director of the Census Bureau, were on hand for the event.  
The clock does not pretend to be exact in its minute-by-minute estimate of population. Census officials believe, however, that it is not more than 24 hours off in either direction.

Results of the last national census in 1950 showed the population of 150,000,000 at that time.  
The clock's population tally increases by one every 11 seconds.

## Suspect's Auto Outruns Police

GASTONIA — An automobile driven by one of several suspects in the \$2,000 payroll holdup at Myrtle Cott Mill here outdistanced a patrol car of the Clover, S. C., highway today, as police pressed the search for two teenage bandits.

Capt. Ray Smith of the Gastonia Police Dept. was on his way to Clover this morning when he spotted the driver in what resembled the getaway car used yesterday.  
But the car, at that time headed toward South Carolina, apparently doubled back into South Carolina and escaped Capt. Smith.

Police would not identify the driver but said he is definitely a suspect in the case.  
Roadblocks and a two-state alert have so far failed to turn up the youthful gunman and his companion who held up assistant paymaster H. L. Dellinger.

The Clover Police Dept. authorized use of an airplane to assist in the search yesterday.  
The holdup occurred about 10:30 a.m. yesterday, half an hour after Mr. Dellinger and Miss Betty Gordon returned to the mill's pay office from the Citizens Bank in Gastonia.

While his companion waited outside in a 1952 or 1953 black Ford, the 26-year-old gunman ordered Mr. Dellinger to hand over the entire payroll.  
As a result of the holdup, employees who were scheduled to receive their pay at 1 p.m., did not get it until 5 p.m.

## Priest Is Sentenced

BERLIN (AP)—An East German court has sentenced a Catholic priest, Kaplan Hugo Herberich, to 18 months imprisonment on charges of possessing West German books.  
Church officials in West Berlin said the priest was arrested in a packed daily by Communists who demanded the priest's conviction.

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Pope is gone. And a mighty important stove it is too.  
Workmen looked everywhere, in the Vatican warehouses and outside, but they could not find it.

This stove is used to signal the outcome of votes at papal conclaves in the Sistine Chapel.  
The meeting to elect a new Pope is just 10 days away.

## Faubus Slaps Board Law May Force Teacher Release

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—The Little Rock School Board today faced the threat of legislative action to make it teachers' choice for a private school operation.

Gov. Orval E. Faubus accused the board of blocking progress on the private education plan by refusing to free its teachers from their contracts.  
After conferring with the governor, State Rep. Paul Van Dusen of Perry County said if the board continues in its refusal the legislature will step into the matter.

"If necessary we will release them by abolishing the district altogether," Van Dusen said. He added that other legislators agreed with his viewpoint.  
Dr. William G. Cooper, a School Board member, replied to Faubus' charge by saying the board had not attempted to sell public school teachers what to do.

### LAWYER'S ADVICE

The teachers have been advised by School Board attorneys not to participate in any private school plan, in view of a federal court order issued last month restraining the board and all other parties from engaging in such a plan.  
The order was extended Wednesday by the U.S. 8th Circuit Court of Appeals at St. Louis.

Presiding Judge Joseph W. Woodruff of the special three-member panel said the edict will remain in force until the court makes its final ruling "as soon as possible."  
The order was broadened to include not only the School Board but all others who might try to force integration through the Little Rock Private School Corp. The court said the order had to be extended to protect what racial integration had already been accomplished in Little Rock schools.

Six Negroes are enrolled at the closed Little Rock Central High, the only school in the city which has been integrated.  
Leaving of school buildings for the purpose apparently of multiplying the racial integration which up to this point has been achieved is forbidden by the order.

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## Oil Explosion Kills Worker

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Explosions, followed by fire, demolished a multi-million-dollar offshore oil production platform, killed one crewman and sent 21 others to hospital.

Seven others were unaccounted for in an inferno in the Gulf of Mexico, 60 miles south of New Orleans. Five, possibly all six, oil wells clustered under the platform burned uncontrolled.  
Fataally injured was T. P. Butler of Liberty, Miss.

A brother, E. A. Butler, also of Liberty, was reported missing. Critically burned was E. C. Swanson, 44, of Algiers, La. Three other crewmen were in serious condition.

The workmen were hurled or jumped from the platform, 80 feet above the 30-foot-deep water. Survivors were picked up by surface craft and taken to a nearby undamaged platform where they were picked up by helicopters and brought to hospitals in the New Orleans area.

## High-Flying Rocket Lauded

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Air Force, the Navy and the new civilian space agency have proudly trumpeted the forerunner of tomorrow's space vehicle out into space view.

Vice President Nixon called the new rocket-powered X-15 a "major step in man's greatest adventure in exploration beyond our world—the first and logical step in space exploration."  
"With the X-15 following the magnificent achievement of the Pioneer moon-rocket satellite, Americans can proudly say that the United States has recaptured the lead, that we have moved into first place in the race to outer space," Nixon said Wednesday at rollout ceremony for new space probe.

"We are on threshold of even more exciting adventures into space, of which X-15 is but one manifestation," he said.  
"X-15 is perhaps most exciting because of the fact that it is designed to carry man into space for the first time."

There was no official explanation for the blast. One of the injured crewmen, Amy Lavergne, 43, of Eunice, La., told newsmen the first he knew was the explosion of an oil tank on the deck of the platform.  
A helicopter pilot, R. J. Thomas, said, "I've seen ships on fire and I've never seen anything bigger than this."  
Survivors said billowing smoke made it difficult to find Helibats.

## Vatican's Ballot-Burning Stove Lost

OLD MODEL CAN'T BE FOUND

Its chimney thrust through a window.  
If the cardinals failed to agree on a new Pope, a little bit of straw was mixed with the ballots. That produced a gray smoke. People watching from St. Peter's Square knew the cardinals had failed to elect a pontiff.

If two-thirds of the cardinals present plus one voted for a Pope, then the ballots were burned without straw. The result was white smoke. To the crowds in the square, that meant

a new Pope had been elected.  
Now today there is no stove, and no one has an idea what happened to it.

The stove was used only during conclaves. In between it was taken from the Sistine Chapel and returned to a warehouse. It was last used in 1959 and presumably had been stored away after that conclave elected Pope Pius XII. Possibly, it was just misplaced.

"It's hard to think that someone would steal it," a Vatican official said.  
Vatican officials looking

around Roman shops for a new one could find only modern electric or gas heaters without the old-fashioned stovepipe the missing one had.

These may have to get a stove made. Centuries ago the ballots were burned without a stove, and the smoke was permitted to escape from the Sistine Chapel without a chimney.

PAINTING SMUGGED

A stove just has to be found.
