# Mrs. Evans Takes Over Bus Strike Peace Try

## Bomb Goes Off, Kills Its Carrier

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—A makeshift bomb exploded in the lobby of Wichita's multi-million-dollar municipal airport terminal today, killing its carrier.

Police Chief Eugene Pond said the blast victim was Forest Don McCuson, Tulsa, Okla.

The man's right hand had been blown off at the wrist and asked for change for a quarter of the blast.

No other casualties were reported immediately. Dozens of windows were shattered but there was no fire.

### WOMAN WITNESS

Mrs. Joann Embree, clerk for a car rental firm, witnessed the blast and said she narrowly escaped picking up the bomb a few seconds before it exploded.

Mrs. Embree said McCuson approached her counter and asked for change for a quarter.

"I gave him the change and watched him make a brief telephone call," she said.

After the phone call, McCuson came back to the car rental desk and asked Mrs. Embree where he could find the lost-and-found department.

Mrs. Embree gave him directions, and he placed a brown paper-wrapped package and a leather briefcase on the counter.

She said she reached out to take the package and actually touched it when McCuson said, "No," and grabbed the briefcase and package, then walked away.

### WALKED 40 FEET

Mrs. Embree said he had walked about 40 feet when the bomb exploded.

Police Chief Eugene Pond said every available man was immediately placed on the case. The FBI also was at the scene.

The leather briefcase carried by McCuson seemed to be undamaged, police said, and was taken to the police laboratory by police investigator Clyde Bivis.

The briefcase was taken to an open area first because police feared another bomb might have been in it.

## Man, Cash Sought In Payroll Case

CLOVER, S. C.—Police searched the home of accused holdup man Albert Junior Ledford near here today but found neither Ledford nor the \$6,839 Gastonia cotton mill payroll he is accused of stealing.

Ledford's brother-in-law, Walter King, yesterday identified the York County man as gunman in Wednesday's holdup but arrested innocents as authorities took him to Gaston County jail.

Continuing the manhunt, Clover Police Chief W. T. Byers said Ledford's house in the Oak Ridge Road section of York County was searched between 2:30 and 3 o'clock this morning.

But officers found no trace of the missing money.

Law enforcement authorities are covering every mile of ground between Gastonia and Clover in their search for Ledford. Bloodhounds from a airplane camp in Dallas and an airplane were used in the search late yesterday.

Councilwoman Martha Evans in the absence of Mayor Smith was pulling out all stops today in an effort to bring to an end the bus strike that has crippled Charlotte since Oct. 1.

Mrs. Evans said if a joint meeting of union and bus company officials, along with federal mediator Dr. Yates Heatter, fails to bring about a solution to the strike this afternoon, she will call both groups into a conference with a Citizens Committee tonight.

"I have only the interest of the people of Charlotte at heart," Mrs. Evans said, "and I consider the bus strike is a disaster state wide."

"It's keeping some people from getting to their jobs."

### BUS HEAD HERE

Merle C. Morrow, vice president and general manager of the bus line, was scheduled to arrive in Charlotte today to take part in the joint bargaining session.

Mrs. Evans said she will ask union officials and bus line officials to approach the problem from a fresh point of view.

"The people of Charlotte are hurting and I think both sides should keep an open mind on the subject."

Mrs. Evans said Mr. Heatter was possible to call both sides into session with the Citizens Committee tonight if an agreement is not reached this afternoon.

### AT CITY HALL

If such a meeting is necessary, it will be held in the mayor's office.

Mrs. Evans asked City Attorney John Shaw to contact the Attorney General's office in Raleigh this morning to see if the Utilities Commission might support her in an attempt to get the buses back on the streets while the negotiations are going on.

Mr. Shaw reported that Mrs. Evans said the commission could not vote the strike.

### CAN DO NOTHING

Mr. Moody said the Utilities Commission "can do nothing. It has no authority to intervene in any way."

Mr. Moody said the public interest of the commission are available to the city if they can be used in any way.



Rockwell Poses With Anti-Jewish Literature He Printed

## 'Blast' Just Term Bomb Case Letter Author Is Located

ATLANTA (AP)—Five men were indicted today on charges of destroying a house of worship in the Sunday dynamiting of Atlanta's Jewish Temple.

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP)—An Arlington printer who turns out anti-Jewish literature acknowledged today he wrote a letter which has figured in the investigation of the bombing of a Jewish temple in Atlanta.

The letter mentioned a "big blast." But, big husky, George Lincoln Rockwell, 40-year-old former Navy pilot in World War II, says the reference was to a picketing demonstration—not to any bombing.

Rockwell said the letter was written last July to Wallace H. Allen in Atlanta. Allen is one of five men held in Atlanta for questioning about a dynamite blast that ripped through Atlanta's Jewish temple last Sunday.

Rockwell said reporters his letter to Allen was written last July at the time plans were being made for picketing at the White House and in Atlanta against "Zionist, Communist Jews."

The letter mentioned a "blast" who was supposed to be helping finance the anti-Jewish material.

Rockwell said he had told the FBI that Allen had written him opposing the picketing of the Atlanta temple "since it relates to the religious (rather than to the political)."

Rockwell prints anti-Jewish material in the basement of his home. It appears under the name of the "National Committee to Free America from Jewish Domination."

In Atlanta, it was reported that police may present to a grand jury today the evidence gathered in the investigation of the dynamite blast at Atlanta's Jewish temple.

But R. F. Little, one of the leaders of the concentrated police probe, hinted that might be the most favorable move in view of their action to fire five men all ready held in the case.

Attorneys for the five are seeking their release on grounds they are being detained illegally. A hearing on the writs has been set for Tuesday.

Three courses are open to police:

1. Answer the writs and expose evidence which may have been gathered thus far.
2. Fail to contest the writs and have the five men ordered set free.
3. Present the case before the grand jury, where witnesses would not be subject to cross-examination by defense attorneys.

Meanwhile, FBI agents were as busy police in the search for the person or persons who set off a big bundle of dynamite at the temple before dawn Sunday.

## Mother's Note Explains Four Fatal Shootings

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—A well-to-do mother, who complained, "I am second to TV and books," was found shot to death with her three children Thursday night.

Mrs. David E. Horne, 42, whose husband owned a plumbing company here, died in St. Mary's Hospital a short time after her children, Marilyn Francis, 8; David Robert, 11; and John, 9.

An unsigned note found on a bed and which police reported was in Mrs. Horne's handwriting said: "I can't talk, so I'll write. I can't do it alone. I can't stay here any longer. The children and I don't fit anywhere. We're not really wanted."

"They will have tormented without me as I did, so it is best that they go now, too, straight to heaven as they are good, sweet and adorable."

### 'IT'S WORTH THAT'

"Whatever happens to me is worth that. I tried, but I never really had a chance. It's all shame and pretense. I am second to TV and books."

"I am supposed to be well off. But I have nothing to say about how I live every day of my life."

Set J. L. Parkwood of the West Palm Beach police department, said the father, David E. Horne, telephoned last night that he had found his family wounded.

Parkwood said Horne told officers he believed his wife gave sleeping pills to the children before the shooting.

Horne discovered the bodies when he arrived home in a 1959 model station wagon he bought as a birthday present for his wife.

Investigators theorized the children were placed in separate rooms before the shooting. Marilyn was found in a bedroom with her mother and David was in the hall.

Police were led to the third victim by the beam of a flashlight. They expressed belief John was shot as he ran from the house with the flashlight.
