2 Cars Derailed

Passenger Train In Minor Mishap

Two Pullman cars of a Southern Railway passenger train slipped off the rails just south of the Charlotte depot early this morning but railroad officials said there was only one minor injury.

The derailment, involving two cars of Train 31, happened shortly after 4 a.m. At the time of the derailment, passengers were sleeping in the two cars.

"Some of the passengers didn't even know they were on the ground," one railroad man said. "The one injury, a minor cut on a Negro woman, was treated by local physicians and the woman was put back on a train to continue to her Rock Hill destination. The woman was not identified."

ENGINE HIT

One of the two cars that slipped off the rails just after Train 31 left a siding for the main track smashed into a switch engine on another siding. The impact tore open one corner of the Pullman car and smashed the glass portion of the switch engine beside the fireman's position.

The Southern's schedule was not affected by the derailment. Officials said trains were not delayed and sidings and bypassed the two cars.

Cause of the derailment had not been determined this morning. It happened some 100 feet south of the point where Train 31 had switched from the siding to the main track.

Only the last two cars of Train 31, whose destination was Augustin, Ga., were derailed. The engine, No. 31 and other cars in the line had already passed the point where the derailment occurred.

WORK BEGUN

Workmen this morning removed the switch engine, which was not derailed, and were in the process of moving the two Pullmans.

Third-Stage Failure Cancels Moon Rocket

Anger Up In Killings On Cyprus

LONDON (AP)—Public anger mounted in Britain today over the killing of British civilians on Cyprus.

Demands for tougher measures against terrorists who have struck with deadly regularity since 10 British civilians in six weeks, came from all sides.

Some members of the ruling Conservative Party have pressed Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd for stern action.

Conservative Robert Speir will request appointment of a military governor for Cyprus in the House of Commons next Wednesday, it was reported.

Support for the appointment of Field Marshal Sir Gerald Templar as military governor on Cyprus was reported growing in some parliamentary circles.

Templar, former chief of British imperial general staff, scored successes against jungle terrorists during his tenure as British commander in Malaya six years ago, the present governor of Cyprus is a civilian, Sir Hugh Foot.

The slaying of 34-year-old Anthony Brown in Cyprus yesterday—just 48 hours after a similar killing of a British visiting official—focused attention on Cyprus terrorism.

Said the Conservative Daily Telegraph: "Government in Cyprus cannot be maintained at all unless immediate drastic and effective measures are taken against the murder of civilians."

The Telegraph said "present leadership on Cyprus, both civilian and military, is being called in question."

The Telegraph accused Archbishop Makarios, exiled Greek Cypriot leader, of being the "author of these murders."

It also accused the Greek Orthodox churchman of wrecking attempts by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to settle the dispute between Greek and Turkish Cypriots on the future of the island, now a British possession.

The Daily Express said "the killing believe that if they keep up their campaign of senseless murder long enough Britain's nerve will crack. Britain must at last get tough."

HONEYMOON'S IN PROGRESS AT AGED HOME

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP)—Honey-mooning a home for the aged today are the former Mrs. Ametie Teiborg, 92, and her second husband in two years, Webster Goodrich, 82.

They were married Friday in the First Baptist church by Dr. J. Whitcomb Brouger Jr. He officiated her 1956 marriage to the late James Teiborg.

Goodrich, a former North Dakota farmer, met his bride-to-be when he moved into the home for the aged in nearby Sunland last August. Mrs. Teiborg, who has six grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren, has lived there since February 1956.

Ill-Fated Air Force Rocket Rises From Launching Pad

AF Vehicle Burns In Re-Entry

By VERN HAUGLAND CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The Air Force launched its third moonrocket early today but failed to get it into outer space when its third stage misfired.

It rose only about 1,000 miles—only a fraction of the 220,000-mile distance to the moon.

The 53-ton rocket took off in perfect form at 2:30 a.m. EST. Less than 10 minutes later, the Air Force reported that all the rocket's three main stages had fired. It said the launching "has now been accomplished."

But within a few minutes a radio test showed that the third stage failed to ignite.

In Washington, a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said "At this time we don't know why the third stage did not fire."

DATA CHECKED

NASA scientists studied data obtained from tracking stations and announced about two hours after the launching that the rocket reached an altitude of about 1,000 miles before falling back into the earth's atmosphere.

The agency said it entered the atmosphere over south-central Africa—about 7,500 miles from Cape Canaveral—and burned up due to air friction.

BIG BLOWOUT

The first Air Force try fizzled on Aug. 17 when the big rocket blew up after 77 seconds of flight. But on Oct. 11, a second 84-foot rocket traveled about 90,650 miles toward the moon before falling back into the atmosphere and burning up from friction.

Rep. Hays Says Faubus Aided Defeat

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Brooks Hays (D-Ark.) says Gov. Orval Faubus played a big role in Hays' defeat Tuesday by a written pledge to support Democratic party nominees in the general election.

Faubus was reported en route to Florida and unavailable for comment on Hays' remarks.

Hays, ousted after 16 years in the house, said he didn't know just what Faubus did in the campaign. "But in the district it is not disputed by friend or foe that he was for my opponent," Hays added at a news conference.

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Cattfish Cole Still At Work

James (Cattfish) Cole, Klan leader and unsuccessful South Carolina write-in candidate for governor, dropped out today and was not expected to appear at the polls.

Cole held a business meeting with the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan here last night and reported the group "growing by leaps and bounds."

But Cole said his biggest project was help for the five Atlanta men indicted in the Jewish synagogue dynamiting last month.

He said he will appear at the courthouse steps in Atlanta at 8 p.m. Wednesday and "try to raise money for their defense."

"I think these boys are innocent," he said, "and will make a plea for funds to help in their legal defense."

"I have every reason to believe they are innocent, were falsely indicted and are innocent observers," he said, and not as a KKK leader.

Some activities throughout the South have not slowed.

"I am scheduled for a Jacksonville, Fla., appearance next Friday night and a Klan rally at West Palm Beach Saturday night. I am still going about our work," he said.

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ERRING DRIVER SURVIVES 'Wrong Side' Wreck Kills 7

NORWALK, Ohio (AP)—Alive but incoherent, a wrong-way turnpike driver was the only survivor today of a head-on collision that killed seven persons. A state patrolman was speeding to head him off when the crash came.

Why was John M. Hines Jr., 41, of Detroit, headed east in a westbound lane? Ohio Turnpike officials tried to piece together clues today, but admitted it was guesswork. Hines was in Fisher-Titus Memorial Hospital here and in no condition to be interviewed. He was reported "fair."

Worst Crash

Six members of a Jamestown, N. Y. family and Hines' passenger, Mrs. Claudia Brooks, 45, also of Detroit, were killed in the Turnpike's worst crash since it opened Oct. 1, 1953.

It was only the second head-on collision of the toll road's history. On the other occasion

a truck plumed across the 50-foot median strip which prevails throughout the distance. In the other car last night were George N. Bentley, 52, of Jamestown, his wife Della and their four boys, aged 18 months, and 3, 12 and 13 years.

TICKET FOUND

Patrolmen found an oil-stained toll ticket indicating Hines had entered the Turnpike at exchange No. 5, Stony Ridge. The time was blurred. Stony Ridge is a little east of Toledo, at milepost 70, counting eastward from the Indiana line. This would be the normal entrance for a Detroit head-east.

There was no report of trouble at Fremont interchange No. 6, at milepost 92, nor at the service plaza at milepost 100. This restaurant and gasoline area is known on the south side of the road at Commodore

Perry Plaza and on the north as Erie Islands.

CAR REPORTED

But the patrol's log shows a patrol stopped at Castalia maintenance building, on the north side between milepost 107 and 108, to report an east-bound car in the westbound lane. A radio message went out and the pike headquarter in Berea told a cruising car to give chase. It headed east in the proper lane.

Sgt. J. F. White estimated today the speeding cruiser reached within three or four miles of the wrong-way car.

In most places the median strip is about 6 feet deep, but sometimes it is possible for a car to cross the 50-foot strip and remain upright if handled properly. At the service plaza a car crossing the median strip would attract attention on both sides.
