After hours of questioning, George Jones led police to a pier last night and pointed to where he said 7-year-old Louis Diamond had fallen into the river.

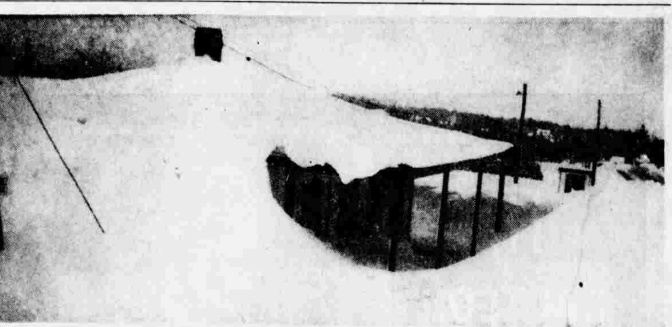
Police arranged to drag the river for Louis, whose parents had reported him missing Sunday.
