## Child Taken At Gunpoint From Aunt

County police Monday night were searching for a man who allegedly took his daughter from her great-grandmother and aunt at the point of a gun.

Officers said a man identified only as James Campbell was charged with two counts of assault with a deadly weapon. Under North Carolina law a man cannot be charged with kidnapping his own child.

Police said his wife, Mrs. Campbell, who lives in Washington, D. C., was separated from her husband and had custody of their three-year-old child.

Campbell had visiting rights but was forbidden by the court to take the child from her mother.

Mrs. Campbell's sister, Gertrude Sullivan of Washington, told officers she brought the baby down to Charlotte to see his great-grandmother, Mrs. Mary Foster of Rt. 7.

Mrs. Foster said that at 9 p. m. Monday Campbell came out to the house, pulled a gun on the two women, grabbed the screaming child and left. Officers checked Campbell's relatives here, who told them they did not know where he lived or where he was Monday night.

## 'Ports Day' Designated

RALEIGH — (UPI) — Gov. Hodges issued a statement Monday designating Thursday State Ports Day in North Carolina in recognition of the important role the Tar Heel ports play in North Carolina's economy.

Hodges pointed out the observance is designed to give the citizens of the state an opportunity to visit the port facilities and familiarize themselves with these arteries of commerce. The observance, he added, is sponsored by the North Carolina Ports Authority and interested citizens and organizations in the port cities.

The governor urged citizens to visit the ports whenever possible. He said the state has invested more than \$7½ million in these facilities and this figure will rise to more than \$12 million when current expansion programs are completed.

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## Screen Star Colman Dies At Age 67

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — (UPI) — Ronald Colman, whose gentlemanly manner set the standard for class on the screen, died of a lung infection Monday at 67.

His wife and co-star, Benda Buma, was at his bedside when he died at 5 a. m. at St. Francis Hospital. He had gone there Sunday morning, suffering a virus lung infection. His health had been delicate since a lung operation a year ago.

Few in Hollywood knew of his illness. He had retired from filmwork in 1934 to lead the gentle life of an English squire at his ranch near Santa Barbara.

Jack Benny, on whose radio and TV shows the Colmans often appeared, expressed Hollywood's shock: "I am deeply saddened at the news of Ronald Colman's death. He was a great actor, a great gentleman and a great friend."

Public funeral services were set for Wednesday afternoon at the All Saints by the Sea Episcopal Church.

Colman remained a star for 35 years probably a record in the movie business. He drew \$1.7 million from the moment he appeared with Lillian Gish in "The White Sister" in 1923 until he made his final film, "The Story of Mankind," last year.

Handsome, polished, intelligent, an inner glow of optimism and goodwill — these were the qualities that contributed to his durability. His clipped, nasal, articulate voice helped him bridge the gap from silent films to sound and became his trade mark.

## 2 S.C. Boys Drowned

DARLINGTON, S. C. — Two teen-agers were drowned late Sunday in the waters of Black Creek, near Hartsville.

Coroner Louis Griffin identified the victims as Johnny Walters and George Gardner Jr., both 19 and both of Route 3, Hartsville.

Griffin said the youths drowned when their boat capsized in the creek.

Three companions told Griffin they tried in vain to rescue the victims after the boat had overturned.

The victims reportedly could not swim. The body of Walters was recovered almost at once, and the newly organized Hartsville rescue squad could not revive him. Gardner's body was recovered early Sunday night.

All five boys were in a 12-foot fishing boat when one dived out and tipped the boat, Griffin said.

Griffin said he would probably hold an inquest later.

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
