Bad Day For Arnie In Open: 5 Bogeys

Medinah, Ill. — Arnold Palmer, now 45 and carrying the pride of golf's old guard in the U.S. Open, started the second round only two strokes behind the young front runners, Pat FitzSimons and Tom Watson, but scored a four-over-par 40 on the first nine.

Palmer began fine, hitting a seven foot birdie on the 300 yard first hole. He followed with a par three on the 187 yard second hole.

Then the roof fell in. He fired consecutive bogeys on the third and fourth holes, parred the 594-yard par five fifth, and then bogied the sixth, seventh and eighth, giving him five

bogeys in six holes.

Par on the ninth gave him 40 for the nine holes.

Meanwhile Jerry Heard, another of the young newcomers, popped five consecutive birdies, from the third hole through the seventh, and was five under par for his first nine with a 31. But Heard had a six over par 77 on

his first round, so with nine holes remaining in the second round, he was one over for the tournament.

FitzSimons, sparked by a hole in one, and Watson, played early yesterday and shot four under par 67's to share first place after the first round.

Robert Bryant scored a second-round 77 to bring his two day total to

152. Douglas Steffen was seven over par on the second round, adding 78 to yesterday's 77 for a total 155. Ron Smith scored a 77 to bring him to 159.

For FitzSimons, lightning failed to strike twice by about eight feet.

That was the distance FitzSimons' tee shot on the par 3, 167-yard second hole missed the pin today. Yesterday,

his six iron had landed less than a foot from the pin and rolled back for a hole-in-one, a break which sparked him to a first round tie at 67 with Tom Watson. Today, FitzSimons' tee shot carried Lake Kadijah and plopped down on the still soggy green, pin high but about eight feet to the right, and rolled only a few inches. He parred.

Market Continues Strong Advance

NEW YORK — The stock market, encouraged by signs of easing inflation, scored its second strong gain in a row in heavy trading today.

The 3 p.m. Dow Jones average of 30 industrials was up 11.89 at 857.24 after a 17.52 jump yesterday.

Gainers overpowered losers by more than a 3-1 margin on the New York Stock Exchange.

At its mid-afternoon reading

the Dow was all but even with its 1975 closing high of 858.73, reached on May 12.

The government reported as trading began that the rise of consumer prices slowed to a 4.8 per cent annual rate in May from 7.2 in April, with non-food items registering their narrowest increase in 20 months.

The NYSE's composite index of more than 1,500 common stock was up .40 at 49.45.

On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index gained .52 to 91.15.

Wrong Day, Wrong Turn

GARDEN CITY, Iowa — It was clearly the wrong day to hit the town's only bank.

Nine state troopers were working speed checks outside town — two of them in airplanes.

But "any day would be a bad day to try a robbery in Garden City, one resident said. Any stranger in town sticks out like a sore thumb."

It began Thursday when a person in a nurse's uniform showed up at the bank.

The bank opened; the nurse went in. "As soon as he talked I knew he wasn't a woman," said bank worker Lucy Fisher. The nurse pulled a gun, grabbed \$2,000 and fled.

The cry went out: "The bank's been robbed!"

Sanford Sheriff Sued

SANFORD — The wife of an inmate who was killed in a jail fire in Seminole County last week has filed a \$1 million suit against Sheriff John Polk, charging him with "negligent disregard" for prisoner safety.

Daisy Campbell filed the suit in circuit court, claiming

that her husband, the father of three, would be alive if officials had maintained adequate fire detection, fire fighting and ventilation equipment in the jail.

Ernest Campbell Jr., 28, was serving a six month term for aggravated assault when he and nine other inmates and a guard were killed by smoke from the blaze.

Episcopal Priest Guilty

CLEVELAND, Ohio — An Episcopal court today unanimously found the Rev. L. Peter Beebe guilty of disobeying his bishop but recommended only that he be admonished for permitting women priests to celebrate Communion in his church.

This is the lightest penalty available, but the court also recommended that the Rev. Mr. Beebe be suspended if he does not follow his bishop's warning to refrain from future violations.

The five-member court said the "essentially unjust" ex-

clusion of women from the priesthood and the sanctity of the Rev. Mr. Beebe "greatly mitigated" his offenses. The court recommended that the admonition be lifted at the end of the 1976 general church convention even if the convention fails to change Church law granting the priesthood to women.

The 30-year-old pastor of Christ Episcopal church in Oberlin was charged with having broken his ordination vows by disobeying the "godly admonition" of Bishop John H. Burt, and with breaking Church law by permitting two women to celebrate Communion last Dec. 8.

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Gang Figure Sam Giancana, Linked To CIA, Found Slain

OAK PARK, Ill. — Sam Giancana, a reputed leader in the Chicago crime syndicate recently linked to alleged CIA plots to kill Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, was found shot to death in his home last night, police said.

Giancana, 45, had been shot once in the right corner of the mouth and five times in the neck, according to Oak Park Police Chief Wilbur Reichert. No weapon was found.

Caretaker Joseph DiPersio, 82, discovered the body lying face up on the kitchen floor in the basement of Giancana's home in this western Chicago suburb, Reichert said.

DiPersio and his wife had been watching television in a second floor room of the house, but they heard no gunshots, possibly because their air conditioner was running, the police chief said.

DiPersio said he saw Giancana alive at 10:30 p.m., but the next time he checked, the reputed mobster was dead. Police received the homicide call at 11:51 p.m.

The FBI joined in investigating the shooting.

three powerful new intercontinental ballistic missiles, two of them with multiple warheads.

Schlesinger's report at a news con-

ference indicated significant progress in new Soviet missile developments since last January.

At the same time, Schlesinger said

that recent Soviet long range missile tests into the Pacific showed that the Russians "are in the process of attaining" improved accuracy with their new family of missiles.

He and other defense officials have expressed concern in the past that deployment of a large number of new accurate Soviet missiles armed with multiple warheads which could be aimed precisely at separate targets, could pose a knockout threat to U.S. missiles by the early 1980's.

Schlesinger said "I find it disquieting" that the Soviet Union has been unable to see the mutual advantage of avoiding acquisition of a major ability to destroy an opponent's missiles in a surprise first strike.

The defense secretary said he wished the Russians showed "more restraint" in moving toward such a "confrontation" ability, which he and others have warned would increase the risk of nuclear war.

At the same time, Schlesinger said bluntly that "we would not allow our position to become secondary."

Schlesinger reported that the Russians have deployed 50 SS19 missiles, each of which has been tested with six multiple warheads (MIRVs). The deployment of this missile continues, Schlesinger said.

He also disclosed that ten SS17 missiles, each of which can carry four multiple warheads, are now combat ready at launch bases inside Russia.

The biggest Soviet missile, the SS18, is operational with a single warhead, he said, adding that 10 of them are already in place.

A multiple warhead version of the giant SS18 has not yet been deployed, but Schlesinger said he expects this to happen "on the basis of tests to date."

In two SS18 tests in the Pacific earlier this month, Schlesinger said, at least seven multiple warheads were dispensed by single SS18's.

Last January, Schlesinger announced the deployment of the single warhead version of the SS18 and said there were indications that the SS19 was starting to enter Russia's nuclear strike force.

Murdered Teen Girls Identified As Local

Two girls found shot to death near U. S. 27 were identified today as Barbara Susan Schreiber and Belinda Darlene Zetterwer — both 14 years old and students at Attucks Middle School in Hollywood.

Broward Sheriff Edward J. Stack said the Schreiber girl lived at 4966 Sarazen Dr., Hollywood. The Zetterwer girl lived at 642 SW 44th Terr., Fort Lauderdale.

Stack declined to discuss the details of how the girls were identified or whether his officers may be near solving the case.

"At this point we can say this is going to be a really difficult case."

"We are going to do an intensive search into their backgrounds and their companions," Stack said.

Dozens of parents have been viewing photographs of the two girls since they were found by a family on a fishing outing two miles north of Sawgrass Recreational Park yesterday. Each had been shot with a single, large caliber bullet.

Their fully clothed bodies were on a gravel road west of U. S. 27 about 150 yards from where another young woman's body was found Sunday — also by fishermen.

Sheriff's deputies believe the two were brought to the spot and murdered there.
