HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Rebels who kidnapped 10 U. S. and two Canadian engineers from a mining camp told an American wife that the men would be treated well and released after a few days.

## Castro's Hostages To Be Free Soon

The Cuban government tried today to get the men back. U. S. Ambassador Earl E. Smith said he expects "the men will be released fairly soon and unharmed." The men were abducted from Moa on Cuba's northeast Thursday night by 200 rebels who the U. S. State Department said were commanded by Raul Castro, brother of rebel chief Fidel Castro. Three Cubans were killed.

Fidel Castro has been trying since December, 1956, to overthrow President Fulgencio Batista by attacks from the Sierra Maestra, 100 miles southwest of Moa, although his forces have not been very active since defeats in April. Castro has accused the United States of helping Batista.

## WIFE TOLD

Mrs. John Schissler, wife of a kidnapped California engineer, said a rebel leader told her the men were taken in reprisal for the alleged U. S. aid but they would be well cared for and released in a few days.

Officials of the Moa Bay Mining

Co. reportedly went into the hills to dicker for release of the engineers. The officials expressed confidence that Castro would turn them loose when they pointed out that the incident was bad publicity in the United States.

The rebels dramatized their cause last February by kidnapping Juan Fangio, world champion auto racing driver from Argentina, in Havana and releasing him unharmed.

Smith said U. S. Consul Park Wollan was investigating the abduction and would make a full report. Wollan was ordered not to try to deal with the rebels, the ambassador said.

2 KILLED

Wollan said the raid began at 8:30 p. m. with the rebels routing 14 army men. Two civilians and one soldier were killed. Eight engineers were taken from quarters 1½ miles east of Moa and the others from the small city itself.

In apparently well-planned fashion, the rebels worked about 11 p. m. with medical supplies, food, 19 vehicles and a 2,500-gallon gasoline tank truck.

The engineers are employed by Freepress Sulphur Co. of New York and subcontractors to build facilities for mining and concentrating nickel and cobalt.

## Bell-Love Race Helps Spark Vote

There was brisk voting in many precincts in Charlotte and Mecklenburg County early today.

Democrats and Republicans turned out in good number for second primary elections. Most of the interest was centered on the state Senate race between incumbent Sen. J. Spencer Bell and Rep. Jack D. Love.

Voting was particularly heavy in precincts which were carried by Rep. Love in the first primary on May 31.

There was a large Negro turnout today and also a steady stream of voters went to the polls in the Bell-Strung Myers Park and Eastover sections.

Sunny skies greeted the voters today and a News survey checked voting in the following boxes:

Precinct 1, County Courthouse, had more than 100 voting this morning. The total vote in the first primary was 338 with Love winning the margin over Bell and Rep. James B. Vogler.

## GOOD RETURNS

Precinct 8, Myers Park High School, had 400 voting before noon which is considered a good turnout. A total of 693 voted in the first primary with Bell taking the lead.

Precinct 2, Second Ward High School, has 127 voting with the total for the first primary 238. Love won the box earlier.

Precinct 35, Northwest Junior High School, had 182 voting before noon, and the total vote in the first primary was 429 with Love winning.

Precinct 13, Villa Heights School, had a turnout of 53 — about average — this morning. Love won the box the first time and the total vote was 217.

Precinct 14, Hawthorne Junior High, had a large turnout of 118 voters. The first primary total was 373 with Love taking the margin.

Precinct 5, First Ward School, voted heavily in the opening hours with 108 casting ballots. Love carried this box in the first primary with the total vote only 205.

Number of "first time" voters showed up today.

Paw Creek 4, Thomasboro School, saw 233 voting by noon. Love carried this box the first time.

Goldfine's Records Sought To Clean Out Adams Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Fred B. Bennett (R-Mich.) said today he will insist that House investigators get all of Bernard Goldfine's records to find the truth amid conflicting statements in the Sherman Adams controversy.

"That's the one way we can corroborate all these things," said Bennett after hearing fresh testimony from Boston businessman John Fox about relationships between Goldfine, millionaire Boston industrialist, and Adams.

HOUSE ROUGHT?

Yesterday Fox, who published the now-defunct Boston Post, said last night a title search showed the house now occupied by Adams has been owned by Mrs. Dorothy B. Kerr since 1928.

Late yesterday, Adams blasted as "another malicious falsehood" a statement by Fox that Goldfine once said in the presence of Adams and Fox that Adams "is going to take care of" some from Bern Goldfine was having with the Federal Trade Commission.

"I deny it ever happened," Adams said in a statement.

## Bombing Case Story Untold

GAFNEY, S.C. (AP)—Solicitor J. Allen Lambright said today that a statement from a now-dead defendant completely described the bombing of a doctor's home here last Nov. 19.

But the statement is not now admissible as evidence, he added.

Magistrate I. B. Kendrick, who presided yesterday at a hearing for four men — identified by police as Ku Klux Klansmen — charged in the case, said it would be Monday before he announced his decision whether to hold them for grand jury action.

Defense attorneys John Long, Union County state senator, and Johnathan McKown of Gaffney, raising a storm of objections, prevented the statement of Robert P. Martin Jr., 35, from entering the record. Martin died Feb. 27 when a car slipped from a jack and crushed him while he was working beneath it.

"It was our whole case," Lambright said of Martin's statement.

The defendants — Junior Painter, 30; James F. McCallough, 25; Luther E. Boyette, 32; and Cletus Sparks, 24 — did not testify.

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## Long Fight Reported In Tripoli

BEIRUT (AP)—A battle raged for more than 12 hours overnight in Tripoli between government and rebel forces, insurgent sources reported today.

Eight persons were killed and about 20 wounded—many of them bystanders caught by stray bullets—the reports from the northern port city said.

Maan Karami, brother of the northern rebel leader, Raschid Karami, said that it had been the most violent night for Tripoli since the Lebanese crisis began 20 days ago.

Lebanese security forces were braced for new onslaughts after stopping four rebel attacks yesterday in the gravest challenge so far to President Camille Chamoun's pro-Western government.

The battle in Tripoli began at 10 p. m. last night when armed men infiltrated close to security force positions, Karami said.

NOISE HEARD

The shooting began to subside this morning, but at noon the clatter of artillery still could be heard in the hills surrounding Tripoli.

Security forces reportedly used heavy artillery frequently during the battle. It was the third straight day of heavy fighting around Tripoli.

An army communique reported the attacks were put down yesterday with the help of jet planes, artillery and armored cars — one of the army's biggest shows of strength during the seven-week rebellion.

Heavy fighting broke out in the morning and again in the afternoon in the capital's Basta Mosque quarter. Armored cars wiped out a rebel street barricade to claim one victory.

At Hasheya in southern Lebanon, the communique said, an attack on the army garrison was driven off in a sharp exchange of gunfire. Another attack at the north Lebanese port of Tyne was stopped, the army said, after rebels advanced within 50 yards of security positions.

LESS TROOPS

The rebels claimed control of three-quarters of this Middle Eastern republic, which is smaller than Connecticut, and say they will keep fighting until Chamoun quits.
