Investigation Shifts

Alleged Trucking Rackets Probed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators, backed by a series of Fifth Amendment pleas, took a new tack today in their probe of alleged mob infiltration of businesses and labor unions.

The Senate Rackets Investigation Committee turned its attention to alleged trucking rackets in East St. Louis, Ill., and charges that gangsters have muscled their way into the garment industry in New York and Pennsylvania.

Called to testify were:

- James Plumeri, a convicted New York labor extortionist.
- Russell Bufalino, described by the committee as a gangster operating in Pennsylvania's garment industry. The government is trying to deport Bufalino.
- Frank (Buster) Wortman, reputed head of the remnants of the old Shelton gang in East St. Louis.
- Robert F. Kennedy, the committee counsel, said he also expects testimony from Thomas (Three Finger Brown) Luchese, an alleged New York hoodlum, and Abe Chalk, whom Kennedy termed a major power in the New York garment industry and an associate of gangsters.

Bufalino is the only one of the day's scheduled witnesses named as having attended an alleged crime convention last fall in Appalachia, N. Y.

Since the hearings began last Monday, five witnesses have refused, on grounds of possible incrimination, to answer questions about the Mafia, secret criminal society, or about an alleged American crime syndicate the committee says poses a serious danger.

Big time New York mobster Vito Genovese, yesterday's main witness, refused to tell the committee whether he had treasonous dealings in World War II with Benito Mussolini, then dictator of Italy.

Genovese, a grim-faced, squat man in a tailored suit, pleaded that an answer to this, and some of the other questions, might incriminate him.

Genovese heard himself pictured as a millionaire "king of the rackets," a power in the Mafia, and a cheat on his federal income taxes.

DOG DAYS BEGIN WITH 90 DEGREES

The charge was to be placed against John Leo Brady, 25, who was to room with the victim, William Brooks of Severn. Brady was held in Miami, Fla., under \$25,000 bond on a federal warrant of car theft.

He was returned to the states after giving himself up to U. S. Embassy officials in Havana.

rebels. Wiecha remained in the hills to continue negotiations.

William indicated those still held would be freed soon. He said he had seen a number of the men, including some servicemen, scattered in various small rebel camps. They are all fine and in good health," he said.

Edward Cannon, 33, of Cornwall, Ont., said he was present at the conference with Raul Castro and the rebel leader — brother of Fidel — promised to stop kidnapping foreigners.

Others in the Moa group released were Henry Salmonson, 46, Portland, Ore.; Anthony Chamberlain, Coral Gables, Fla.; Howard A. Roache, Watertown, N.Y.; and William Koster, 63, Akron, Ohio. They looked weary after five days in captivity. Some were unshaven and most wore dirt-stained clothes. But they praised their captors, and Chamberlain said a rebel doctor treated him for his chronic headaches.

"We were treated fine all the time and made a lot of friends," said Salmonson.

HELP CHARGED

Judging from his statements, the rebels apparently planned the kidnap campaign to dramatize their charges that an alleged United States is helping President Fulgencio Batista's campaign to crush the rebels.

The United States has denied supplying Batista's forces for the anti-rebel drive and canceled all arms shipments to Cuba on March 14.

Salmonson said they were kept on a coffee plantation screened from the air by foliage. He said they were taken on swimming trips and on jeep tours of the wilderness.

"We had good food and enough of it, although it was all Cuban cooking, and beds with clean sheets on them," he added.

Adams had been deducted as business expenses.

Goldfine read a statement issued last night to the press in which he said it was his accountant, not he, who had made out the tax returns.

One of the items for Adams use, an Oriental rug, was bought at Macy's department store across the street from Goldfine's New York office, Goldfine said.

"At Macy's, you get a good buy," Goldfine added.

"I imagine you'll get a letter of thanks from Macy's," Harris said.

"I should," replied Goldfine.

Lichman took over the questioning and handed Goldfine the list of 37 names.

Before today's session, Rep. Peter F. Mack (D-Ill.) said Goldfine's treatment of his favors to Adams amounts to "income tax evasion by the falsely listing gifts as business expenses."

But Goldfine said the bills got routine handling by his accountants and if the Internal Revenue Service "feels we made a mistake ... we will adjust our returns."

Goldfine, who gave his explanation in a statement last night, faces questioning about that and other matters under oath today before a House subcommittee checking charges that Adams, President Eisenhower's top aide, helped Goldfine get favored treatment from federal agencies.

Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark.) said questioning of Goldfine probably will continue next week.

Both Adams and Goldfine have said they exchanged gifts — on a personal basis. Both have denied that Goldfine sought or received favored treatment from the government as a result.

Mack reported the subcommittee, of which he is a member, has evidence to back up most other charges it has heard against Goldfine — including a mystery witness who may attest that Goldfine once said he bought a Washington house for Adams.

MOTIVE TOLD

What was his motive in beating Brooks with a 16-inch long pipe? "I just wanted to drive a Ford, you see?" Brady told Miami County police.

Then, according to Brady's statement, he picked up Bobbit and the two drove to Lynchburg, Va., where the car was abandoned.
