## AL MCGUIRE SAYS SMITH IS A DANDY

THE MCGUIRES will maintain their new home in Chapel Hill, with Pat and the children living there during the season. "We decided Frank wouldn't be away from home anymore in pro ball than he was in college," said Pat. "He seemed to be forever on the road, either with the team or recruiting or on speaking engagements."

"I knew he wanted this so much. I was just like any other wife. I wanted what Frank wanted."

Some of those close to the McGuires feel Pat may have wielded a heavy influence in his decision, because she wanted to get him away from the controversy while the team always to be raging at Chapel Hill.

THE LAST SEASON was a stormy one for McGuire, who had a 126-39 won-lost record at Xavier High in New York in 1957-47, a 103-53 mark at St. John's of New York in five seasons; and a 164-58 tabulation at Carolina, including 32 consecutive victories in 1957.

Early last season, Carolina was placed on a one-year probation by the NCAA for illegal gambling. Promising sophomore center Ken McComb was ruled ineligible at the end of the first semester for scholastic reasons.

Two Carolina players, Larry Brown and Yogi Petrel, were suspended from ACC play for their part in a brawl between the Tar Heels and Duke. McGuire came under heavy criticism from some quarters after this incident.

He remained silent for a short while but came out swinging with a charge that ACC Commissioner Jim Weaver was "out to get him." He also told friends that he felt Athletic Director Chuck

McGuire was dealt a severe personal blow when "two players, Ray Stanley and Lou Brown, were implicated in the nationwide point-shaving scandals and a third, Doug Moe, was charged with accepting \$75 as expense money from Aaron Wagner, key figure in the scandals.

Following hard on these revelations, the Greater University of North Carolina decided to deplete its basketball program, killing the annual Dixie Classic; limiting Carolina and N. C. State to two games apiece with non-conference teams; and permitting only two players from outside the ACC area.

McGuire plans to return to Chapel Hill tomorrow and hold a press conference. "The people back here have been awfully good to me," he said. "I've got to go back and talk to them and answer their questions."

## RELAX, OLDTIMERS—THE BALL'S THE SAME

BALTIMORE — A representative of the company that manufactures baseballs for both major leagues says the balls being used today are the same as the ones Babe Ruth hit for 60 homers in 1927.

"There hasn't been any change in the manufacture of the big league baseballs since 1928," says Duke Ziller, national manager of professional baseball sales and major sports promotion for A. G. Spalding & Brothers, makers of the balls.

"In 1928, the cork center was added to the ball and prior to that, in 1921, they started the use of Australian yarn in the winding," said Ziller on a visit to Baltimore, his native town.

"The ball is not wound tighter," Ziller insists. "It's the same winding, the same yarn, the same cotton, same hides and the same hand stitching that they've used for the last 35 years."

Ziller also discounted any effects of storage. "The balls are made and go out immediately to the clubs. They don't lie around at all. And the temperature under which they are made remains at a constant 70 degrees, the same that it has been for 35 years."

Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris of the New York Yankees have each hit 40 homers this year and are 17 games ahead of Ruth's record 1927 pace.

Ziller attributed the outburst of home runs this year to a lighter bat, some hitters are using and the fact "the major-leaguer today is a bigger man, a stronger man, and better conditioned."
