Act One Ends On A Challenging Note

THE Act I curtain has come down on the investigation of Charlotte's court scandal — but a happy ending to this earthy municipal melodrama is nowhere in sight.

While grand jurors have not disclosed the contents of their report, they have indicated frankly that their conclusions will not be particularly pleasant for all concerned.

The grand jury's precise findings — and the results of those findings — will not be known for awhile. The pro-

cesses of justice are sometime.

But much of what is wrong with the court and lis operation is hardly a secret — something known only to the grand jury. The newspapers have supplied the public with a vertiable checklist of faults. Newspaper reporters actually did most of the early soadework on the scandal. They are still busy. The local bar association has not been idle either. It has launched a survey of faulty practices in both the city and county courts and has submitted to local officials a detailed list of proposed corrective measures which can be taken at once.

Shape of the person to the operation of the court have a clear and present respectability to begin thinking at once of appropriate remedies. There is work to be done and it ought to begin immediately.

Gore Accepted The Fight And Won It

A LBERT GORE won reelection in Ten-nessee without losing his convic-

tions.

This perhaps is the most remarkable and most heartening aspect of the senator's struggle with former governor Prentice Cooper and the variety of well-heeled interests that gave him bank-book backing.

The battle was billed primarily as a test of whether a moderate view on the race question could be sustained in public office in the South. After Gov. Paubus' resounding victory in Arksmass, editor Harry Ashmore of the ARKANSAS GARKITE termed the moderate view "clearly unlenable for any man in public life anywhere in the region" It turns out that it is not untenable for allyer! Gore, who had voted for the revised civil rights bill and had refused to sign the so-called "Southern Manifesto".

the so-called "Southern Manifesto" But there is a broader and a deeper significance in the Tennessee vote. Gore was attacked across the board on the votes he had cast in the Senate. The attacks distorted the record, to be sure: Gore was given no credit by Cooper for Gore was given no credit by Cooper for helping to pull most of the teeth of the civil rights bill he voted for, and Cooper implied that the Southern Manifesto Gore had refused to sign was a meaning-ful document. By indirection at least Cooper managed to make Gore out as an integrationist pink with anti-southern sympathies. Still the attacks however tenuously, were tied to Gore's recordand Gore accepted the fight on those terms.
