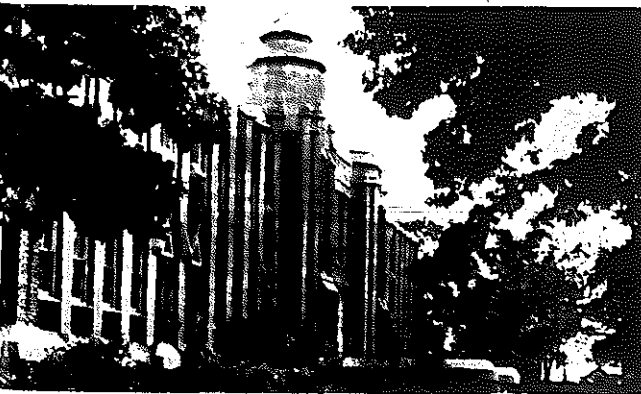


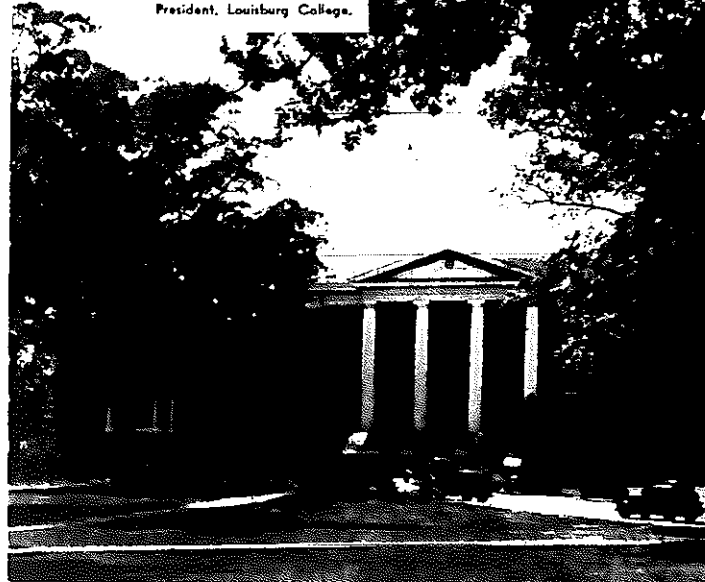

Established in 1779, Louisburg College is the oldest Junior College in the United States. Today has 400 students. The college consists of four buildings, all brick, fire-proof buildings. Offers Liberal and Industrial Arts, Commercial, Home Economics, also both theoretical and practical agricultural training. Faculty of twenty-two. Students from five states, and sixty of North Carolina's counties are represented. Founded by Franklin County as county project known as Franklin Academy, changed Louisburg Female Seminary, 1802; Louisburg Female College, 1885, became property Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1907. In 1931 made co-ed institution and renamed Louisburg College. Member American Association of Junior Colleges. Dr. D. E. Earnhardt is president.

Catawba College is the outgrowth of a movement which had its rise during the early part of the nineteenth century in the growing demand in North Carolina for higher education, and the need of a school for training in the Liberal Arts under religious influences. It was opened by the Reformed Church on December 3, 1851, in Newton, North Carolina. A year later, on December 17, 1852, the college was formally chartered by the State Legislature.

After the academic year of 1922-23, the college was relocated in new buildings at Salisbury, North Carolina, and reopened for academic work in September, 1925, with 127 students in attendance.

Catawba College is a standard four-year co-educational college, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and holding membership in the Association of American Colleges, in the North Carolina College Conference, and in the National Conference of Church-Related Colleges. A broad curriculum is offered, with courses leading to the A.B. degree and the degree of B.S. in Business Administration, Home Economics, and Music.

The College is housed in thirteen commodious buildings on a beautiful eighty-three acre campus at the western edge of the city of Salisbury. The student body numbers 475, from fourteen different states and two foreign countries. Under the able leadership of Dr. Howard R. Omwata, who has been President of the College since 1931, the college has made rapid strides in numeral growth and in scholastic attainment.
