Who Love . Liberty?

COME time ago the Women's International League for Peace and Preedom invited me to speak in Jersey City. This is one invitation that I screpted. I would like to make a speech duty to make a speech in Jersey City. Because in the Supreme Court fight last year I opposed the President's plan for its reorganization with whatever reason, logic and vehemence at my disposal, for the simple reason that I be-lieve that the powers of government should be limited, and the basic rights guaranteed to individuals under the Constitution should not be left to the interpretation of a "kept" court, switched into line—to use the Nazi phrase—

with the policy of this or any other administration. I would have opposed a plan to pack the court if it had been proposed by liberals, conservatives, rea plan to pack see court as most opproposed by liberals, conscratives, re-actionaries, or socialists.

Now, in that Supreme Court fight I found that I was among many comrades—in the Harvard Club, in: the American and the American Bar Association. In fact, those of us who opposed the recognitudino scheme were held up to ridicule by our "liberal" friends because of the company we found ourselver in. That did not make any impression on those of us who realty believed in what twee were fighting for.
