Norway Means Its Protest Against British Trespass

Norway's note to London citing the violation of neutral waters by British warships, is probably in all respects a highly carnest protest. What Norway wants most of all is to continue at peace, and if this precarious state be further jeopardized by the trespassing

peace, and if this precarious state be further jeopardized by the treapsasting of Hritish torpedo boats over into Norwegian waters, it must be stopped.

Biopped, that is, not for the reason that Norwegian lives or property are endangered by these actions, or even because Norwegian interests are directly threatened. Not by Britain, at only rate. After all, a nation which sends its ships into your terrilorish waters and there sinks the enemy? Alpis may be violating your status as a neutral, but a nation which sinks your own ships, wherever it catches them, is much more to be feared.
