Who says that after these months of strikes and production stoppages the Government at last is going to stop allowing strikers to get away with mayhem against the Nation's detense processor?

Who tells the strikers to go back to

Is it President Rosseveit, who has in-stated on keeping all the reins of the production team in his hands, who has consistently refused to make an orderly delegation of authority?

Is it Madam Perkins, the Beeretary of Labor, who up until a few days ago had referred only three of 51 defense strikes to the National Mediation Board?

Who made the long overdue threat? You've got us there. We don't know, Apparently it was not the President. For he "had nothing to say "at his preas conference. If Medam Perkins threat-ened the sirikers—unlikely thought—sire also refused to take responsibility for the statement. No, the ultimatum is ascribed to "a high governmental official" who "refused to be quoted by name." Neither Mr. Roosevelt nor Madam Perkins took the responsibility for saying what had to be said.
