At best it is in an expensive, swindlesheet luxury-this business of allowing members of Congress to send what they will through the mails, postage free, At worst it can become a vicious political kind of direct-mail advertising campaign peddling fascism, pacifism, anti-semitism

peddling faseism, pacifism, anti-semitism or damn foolishness to the American people in time of critis. The worst, through the medium of Wheeler, Nye, and Fish, is now upon us.

By, his own admission, Senator Wheeler has sent out approximately 1,000,000 postal cards, each urging the recipient to adopt the Wheeler brand of isolationism. Many of these cards were addressed to men aerving in the United States Army, Soldiers were invited to join in a political fight.

Senator Wheeler also stands accused of allowing one of the most rabidly fascists and anti-sentille groups in the United States to use hundreds of his franked envelopes. He has denied the charge and threatened to bring suit against Ulric Bell, his accuser, Secretary of the Fight for Freedom Committee. Mr. Bell has publicly repeated his accusation three times since and no cusation three times since and no Wheeler reply has been heard.

As reported in the Washington Merry-Go-Round yesterday, Senator Nye has turned over large quantities of his franks to the Steuben Society of America, This to the Steuben Society of America. This group is distributing a speech by Theodore H. Hoffman (which Nye had inserted in the Congressional record at public expense). Copies of the speech have been given to members of the society folded and enclosed in unaddressed envelopes franked by Nye, so that members may mail them, without expense to themselvs, to other members "of their race" [German, conditional conditions of the condition of the conditio of their race" (German.)

In 1925, when Congress passed an act giving members the privilege of frankling mail for "official business," it was never intended that this courtesy should he prostituted in any such manner. Last year the Post Office Department lost more than \$41,000,000, the bulk of which could have been saved had it not been for free mailing privileges.

The abuse of the frank has grown to such proportions that the appendix to the Congressional record is larger than the report of debates. At every session, member after member asks and obtains consent to include speeches—about anything, about anybody and mostly extraneous—in the appendix. Their purpose is obvious. It costs the member only a trivial sum to get re-prints from the appendix To set up and print a apecch in the appendix itself cost many times as much.
