MARSHALL ASKS FREEDOM TO MOVE ARMY

Wants Right To Send Men Outside of Hemisphere

WASHINGTON (AP)—General George C. Marshall, Army Chief of Staff, recommended today the removal of restrictions which would permit United States armed forces to move to the Western Hemisphere and there were immediate indications this would result in heated debate in Congress.

Marshall also urged that draftees, reserve officers and National Guardsmen be kept in service longer than one year.

Told of these, Senator Johnson, Republican California said the suggestion was "more than a light breeze" and that he would oppose any legislation to permit use of the Army outside the hemisphere.

Also Calls for Longer Service

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Guffey, Democrat, Pennsylvania, approved Marshall's proposal that the emergency troops be held in service more than the year now specified by law. "We are experienced," he said, "and we should be recommended holding them, it must be necessary for national defense."

GUFFEY BACKS CHIEF

Among opponents of the chief of staff's proposals was Senator Adams, Democrat, Colorado, who said he has no right to take American troops to transport them into foreign lands in time of peace to participate in foreign wars in which we have no part.

"They don't come under the Lend-Lease Act," he added.

Senator Norris, Independent, Nebraska commented: "I don't know enough about it, but so far as I can see, I don't see any use in doing it now."

All Kept Vigil For Nazi Subs

A BRITISH PORT (AP)—Every man and woman aboard the ships in the convoy which brought United States Marines to Britain as a guard for the London embassy kept a watch for German submarines during the long Atlantic voyage.

Stations, aircraft, ferry pilots, purses and civilians from the United States and Canada all shared the lookout.

"We slept by day and kept watch by night," one United States Marine related today. "Every man on our ship and on the others was on the alert for the slightest sign of German submarines."

British Hold Air Grip On Continent

LONDON (AP)—Masses of British planes, keeping up the RAF's day and night assaults on German and Nazi-occupied territory, launched what appeared to be another major daylight attack across the Channel today.

While fighter planes scoured the air and went to clear the way, British bombers sped over North France following up overnight attacks which the Air Ministry said were concentrated on the German cities of Cologne, Duisburg and Bremen.

Requisition Jap Vessel

MANILA (AP)—The Tabacalera Company of Manila was notified from Kobe today that the Japanese merchantman Kyushu Maru, carrying cargo from the United States, had been requisitioned by the Japanese Government and ordered not to proceed to its destination.

Manila shipping quarters expressed the opinion that the Japanese Government might be expected to seize the vessel.

Hint British May Be Planning On Invasion

LONDON (AP)—The magazine Avepostle hinted today that the RAF's daylight sweeps and nightly bombardings of the French coast may be a prelude to an invasion of the continent before Aug. 1.

The magazine said the Germans have been ordered to be on the alert for the possibility of a British attack. It added, "has been busy for nearly three weeks casting doubts on that assumption."

"Before this month is out there may be developments which would cause more doubts and hasten all the people over whose lands the struggle must be waged."

"British strategy is still that of receiving the blow of war and some of them are now in a feverish state of mind. But another factor is the fact that the RAF is also in the making and France is probably concerned."

Meanwhile, Avepostle asserted, Germany must go on "at its own risk and when the next piece of British intervention will take place."

Government Might Take Ammunition Plant Over

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Defense Mediation Board called for a showdown late today on a union recognition dispute which caused a strike threat at an important ammunition factory.

The board set a deadline for acceptance or rejection of its recommendations by 10 o'clock today. It urged the AFL-Chemical Workers Union as collective bargaining agent for 500 men employed in the firm's smokeless powder division at Allentown, Pa. The men have voted to walk out next Monday.

Majority Votes Strike At White Motor Company

A majority of 2,000 CIO United Automobile Workers voted to strike at two Cleveland plants of the White Motor Co. which are making scout cars for the Army. The union for the strike was set. The union has asked a wage increase of 10 cents an hour. The present minimum rate was reported to be 75 cents, the average \$1.02 an hour.

Paid Vacations Begun by 150,000 Coal Miners

The nation's 450,000 coal miners began a five-day paid vacation today for the first time in history, but there was some question whether 150,000 of them actually would return to work with the remainder July 8. The CIO Southern Coal Operators' Association said the miners would return to their jobs then unless the conference meanwhile signs a new contract.

North American Plant Turned Back to Owners

When President Roosevelt ordered that the North American Aviation Co. plant at Inglewood, Calif., be closed for three weeks of Government operation, he declared that the plant would be returned to the owners July 8. The CIO said it would not interfere with this essential production, it will not hesitate to take whatever steps may be necessary to assure its continuance.

1,500 Ship Away From Jobs on Army Project

At Louisville—More than 1,500 AFM construction workers, protesting against employment of WPA workers at sub-contracting work, were away from their jobs at a \$4,000,000 construction project at Jeffersonville, Ind., today. The union's officials called the walkout

Russians Fight Hard; Snow In Lwow Area

DNB Makes Report After High Command Declares Backbone of Soviet Armies Appears Broken

Germany's official news agency, DNB, reported "obstinate resistance" by the Russians on the eastern front today, a few hours after the Nazi High Command declared that the backbone of the Red armies appeared smashed along the entire 2,000-mile battle line from the Arctic to the Black Sea.

DNB added that bad weather and stiff Soviet opposition was affecting the conflict, and that snow was falling in the region of Lwow, where the Germans are surging toward the Soviet Ukraine.

Prut River Crossed, Germans Announce

BERLIN (AP)—The German High Command declared today that the resistance of the Red Army appears to have been broken and that an attack is under way on the entire front from the Arctic Ocean to the Black Sea.

Reds Claim German Vanguard Repulsed

MOSCOW (AP)—The vanguard of Moscow-bound German invaders was reported by the Russian High Command today to have been thrown back in repeated attempts to cross the Berezina River, which is the second biggest city. This movement, it was said, had been "working up" for 48 hours.
