**Studies Removal Of 1,500 Ballots**

Raleigh, July 1.—(AP)—Assistant Attorney General T. T. Wade Bruton studied the report of alleged pre-primary irregularities in the third congressional district today but said there probably would be no announcement in the matter for several days.

Attorney General Harry McMullan was away on vacation when the report was received from W. A. Lucas of Wilson, chairman of the state board of elections.

**Ballots Removed.**  
The report deals with the investigation by Lucas and the state bureau of investigation into the removal of 1,500 ballots for the first Democratic primary of May 25 and the finding of some of the ballots, Lucas said, in the possession of Charles L. Abernethy Jr., an unsuccessful candidate.

The removal of the ballots was discovered a week before the first primary and new tickets were distributed and used.

Representative Graham A. Barden was renominated.

Bruton said he had the report "under consideration" but could say no more now.

**3-Year Leaf Plan Gives Protection To Small Growers**

College Station, Raleigh, June 28.—Small two-acre tobacco farmers are protected by the law from further cuts in their acreage allotment should growers adopt the three-year leaf control plan in the July 20 referendum, E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer of N. C. State college, explained today.

Where more than two acres are grown, the farm allotment may not be reduced more than 10 percent from the 1940 flue-cured tobacco allotment. However, this guarantee will not apply to those who violate the marketing quotas.

Large stocks of tobacco on hand, resulting from the tremendous crop of last year, and unsettled conditions abroad as a result of the war caused the secretary of agriculture to proclaim quotas on the 1941, 1942, and 1943 crops.

**Growers To Vote.**  
However, growers themselves will be given the opportunity of accepting or rejecting these restrictions through a formal balloting. Voting places will be set up in each county in which flue-cured leaf is grown.

Any person who will share in the returns from the 1940 crop will be eligible to cast a ballot. A two-thirds majority will be necessary to pass the control program.

Floyd pointed out that growers will have their choice of a three-year program or control in 1941 only. He explained, however, that the three-year plan will assure growers of a more stabilized price, since the Government will be better able to give aid in this long-time planning.
