Usurpation President, Not Congress, Is Foreign Policy-maker

Dorothy Thompson today turns her attention to a fact which The News has repeatedly pointed out in its editorials... that the present attempt of Congress to change the direction of our foreign policy constitutes a rank usurpation of the Constitutional authority of the President.

The House of Representatives has no Constitutional authority at all in the field save that of passing on a declaration of war, his act is null.

The actual war-making power is vested in the President as commander-in-chief of the army and navy. And treaties have repeatedly made real war before Congress got down to the question of declaring it.

Contempt Courts Can Easily Infringe Their Rights In This

The Supreme Court of California has affirmed the conviction of The Los Angeles Times for contempt of court in publishing editorials in 1927 and 1928 dealing with labor cases and the conviction of a woman publisher. The Times claims an appeal to Federal courts on the ground that the courts lack a constitutional right of free speech guaranteed by the Bill of Rights.

LOS ANGELES. — For almost a month I have been traveling all kinds of ways, and I have reached some definite conclusions. First, I detect no firm demand for Roosevelt to run for a third term.

Second, I find among some of his most clamorous admirers a deep distrust of the powers of a President who should make the attempt.

Third, I find little popular enthusiasm for the Roosevelt Presidential personalities in either party. I doubt if there is a real desire to elect Roosevelt.

Fourth, I find that the strongest man in either party would be secretary of State Cordell Hull.

These are generalizations, personal impressions, subject indeed to change. But I had to lay bets they would be on the side of the foregoing propositions.

FOREIGN SITUATION. Hanging over domestic politics is the foreign situation. This introduces a feeling of uncertainty, of a lack of opportunity to act.

There is still strong sentiment for keeping out of war. Yet there are those who are not letting their position be might be in it. The British Empire were smashed.

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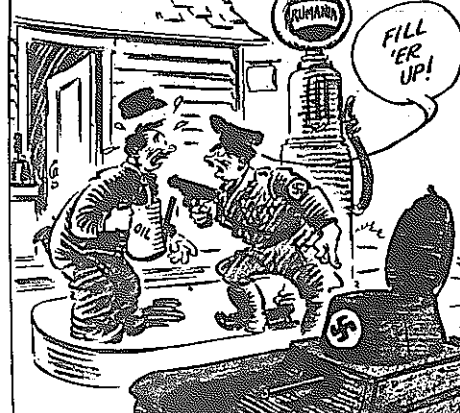

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Executive

FROM time to time during the past years of the Roosevelt Administration, we have found it possible to study the mechanism of the executive branch of the Government...

It is now, I think, time to point to another and equally serious tendency—the tendency of Congress to encroach upon the prerogatives of the executive branch of the Government...

The conduct of foreign affairs is not, under the Constitution, in the hands of the Congress. The House of Representatives has no authority to encroach upon the prerogatives of the Executive.

It is intended that he shall follow the advice of the 71st "Federalist" that "the executive should be in a situation to dare to act on his own opinion."

WE ARE TRYING TO LEGISLATE POLICY. And the 71st paper says that the President should have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate to make treaties.

Now, far from sticking to the sane and sane Constitutional policy of giving the initiative to the President in the conduct of foreign affairs, with the advice and consent of the Senate alone, we are actually passing laws which will partition policy between the Executive and the Legislature.

WE WANT CONTROL OVER FOREIGN AFFAIRS. A democratic nation can and must debate its domestic affairs in the open, and change or modify its program and policy from day to day.

THE CONDUCT OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS. The conduct of foreign affairs demands not only the knowledge of what the American people want, but knowledge of what other peoples want.

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
