New Divine Rights Austrian Legion

THE DECISION of the War Department to form a battalion of Austrians to fight for the liberation of Austria raises the most delicate political questions and already has stirred up a wasp's nest.

It is unfortunate that the announcement of this project, coming from Mr. Stimson's office, is immediately associated with the personality of Archduke Otto von Habsburg. The New York Times, which announced the project in its Friday issue, under a "Wasteful" date line, associated together in the same dispatch the announcement from Mr. Stimson's office and a "simultaneous" announcement that a military committee to "co-operate" in re-creating the membership of the Austrian Legion had been set up under the presidency of Archduke Otto von Habsburg.

Now the question may well be raised, why should a young man, whose father before him was dethroned, who lived in exile during the whole life of the Austrian Republic, and whose family has steadfastly worked for the restoration of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, be recruiting for the United States Army among American citizens? He is, himself, not an American citizen, but a pretender to the throne lost as the result of the last war and also as a result of the success of Woodrow Wilson's American policy of liberating the subject nations of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, Czechs, Jugoslavs and Poles. All these nations are our allies today, as they were in the last war.

The statement emanating from Archduke Otto's military committee obviously claims as "Austrian" Czechs, Hungarians, Jugoslavs and Poles. For he estimates that there are, in the United States, ten million Americans of Austrian descent. Now, in the whole of Austria, as constituted after the last war, with the Succession States removed, there are only six million people. If there are ten million Americans of "Austrian" descent, they are the children of Imperial Austria. And such a claim, if not immediately denied by our authorities, must inevitably lead to confusion and distrust among all the Central European nations, as the Danian affair has produced the utmost confusion among the French people.

The State Department denies that it has anything whatever to do with this action of the War Department, and the War Department claims that it is purely a military measure and has no political implications. But denying political implications does not remove them. The followers of the Archduke are claiming the blessing of the State Department, or, at least, of certain personalities in it.

There are speculations—raised by the Archduke himself—on opening a second front in the Balkans. Now the whole of the Balkans is interested in the question of the future organization of this part of the world. Furthermore, the underground Italian movement is profoundly interested in the question. Every conceivable democratic or national ally that we may find in this territory, the democratic forces in Hungary, the democratic forces in Poland, and the national forces in Poland, and every living Czech, and also all the pro-British, pro-American, pro-democratic forces in Austria itself regard the Austro-Hungarian monarchy and its pretender as another.

Furthermore, such underground movements as exist in Germany are anti the Habsburg Empire. To play with it is to play directly into the hands of Hitler and his New Order, whose propaganda agents will now have to use it to make National Socialism appear as a relatively progressive force.

But I am suggesting that the War Department is interested in the question of the future organization of this part of the world. To Guard Russia German Power To Be Saved

WASHINGTON. AN EXPERIENCED international authority is back from London telling Senators that British official thoughts of the post-war world run astray from those our officials have been expressing weekly, globally, etc.

They are Russia first as a major world power. If Germany is effaced by the peace treaty and France continues the downward path she has been running for decades, Russia might expect to rule Europe. Therefore, this authority expects Britain to come to the peace table with ideas somewhat like Queen Wilhelmina has so far advanced—against a successful extermination of Germany as a nation. He believes Britain will want a strong democratic Germany maintained as a balance of European power.

Refugee governments in Britain already are jockeying, if not vying, with each other diplomatically. They seem only to want back what they had before, and, as a whole, tend toward re-establishment of the old Europe, except all are more or less afraid of the Communists.

This information is not intended as a statement of official British policy. Churchill will expand his promise to keep the British Empire whenever he feels ready. They are certainly suggesting our officials had better get down to earth in their thinking of the post-war world and planning for it, and prepare themselves to meet a new standard of knowledge that they are all going to be human beings, and that nobody has turned angel in this war.

First, concrete thought for the peace conference is that it should be held in Washington. This is a world war (the first one, incidentally). Nowhere is there a capital further removed from the center of Europe. And since Africa, that is Washington. The right atmosphere for a good peace is here.
