## Who's Next?

War Threat Closes on Spain With Pressure of Events

THE RUSSIAN SQUECES ON HITLEY'S ARMIES IN the Cauticasus, the fierce resistance met by Allied troops in Tunisia, and the seizure of Toulon by the Nails combine this week to flick the spotlight of war in the Mediterranean from East to West. And there are growing indications that war-weary, half-statwed Spain is the next stop on the march of apreading conflict.

A move toward the Middle East

onflict.

A move toward the Middle East through Turkey seems highly unlikely now that Timoshenko's flerce charge has imperilled Germany's Southern foothold in Russia, and continued Russian presure might make Hitler's entire position around the Black Sea untensity. New signs of the constricting iron ring must have Prd-Axis Francisco Franco of the Falangists on the uneasy seat. As any other observer, he knows that a German counter-blow is in the making against Allied occupation of Africa, and the selsure of Toulon next door was not calculated to reassure him. He is on the record with an unsolicited piedge of neutrality and good-will to Washington, but the Spanish call to arms was sounded in an Axis-like fashion.

Through Spain lies the shortest, cheapest route for Hiller to attempt the closing of the Mediterranean to the Allies. A drive there, even against Spanish resistance, would enable him to assault Gibraliar with heavy guns, bring in a new spread of air power, and make the narrow Western entrance almost impassable. If he was not taking final steps in that direction by taking Toulon and the French ships, then he is varying from his methods of the past. Danger points to the Iberian Peninsula.


