CANBERRA, Australia.—(AP)—Two days of violent air attack which littered the Japanese-won beachheads of New Guinea with the wreckage of an invasion armada battered potential Japanese bases gave directly threatening Australia valuable hours today to muster fighting power for a stand on her own shores.
