CAIRO. — (AP) — The Battle of Egypt was rejoined with unrelenting fury today west of El Alamein in the bottleneck of the coastal approach to the Nile Valley, with the resurgent British Eighth Army striving to exploit its first successful counter-stroke since the Axis invasion started.

Following their repulse in the El Alamein area yesterday the Axis forces fell back to positions some three or four miles to the west to regroup.

The German and Italian forces under "Rommel the Fox" were forced to retreat last evening after a general assault on El Alamein, less than 70 miles short of their main goal, Alexandria, was crushed.

The battle seemed to have been constricted to the mothern sector, in the immediate vicinity of El Alamein, and there were no indications of enemy movements on the edge of the Qattara Depression.
