Refrigerator Ice Broken

WPB Lets 50,000 Out to Retailers

WASHINGTON (AP)—The War Production Board released today for sale to the general public about 50,000 domestic mechanical refrigerators, which had been frozen in the hands of dealers and distributors since Feb. 14.

The WPB at the same time established a program for transfer of refrigerators held by manufacturers and their affiliated distributors to retail dealers and other outlets.

The order, WPB said, will facilitate acquisition of new refrigerators by consumers who certify they have no other refrigeration equipment at their disposal.

LONDON—The German air force made a leaflet raid last night over the South Coast, dropping a four-page pictorial folder on the Dieppe landing to show the prowess of the German troops and reiterating that the attack was intended as a second front thrust.

They Paid The Price Eight American Correspondents Lose Lives Covering War Fronts

NEW YORK (AP)—Reporting the first three years of the war from all battle fronts has cost the lives of eight American correspondents, says the current issue of Editor and Publisher, weekly newspaper trade publication. Seventeen other war correspondents have been wounded or injured and three are missing, the magazine said, adding that "still heavier casualties were in prospect as the fourth year got underway."

Vast Fortress City Will Not Fall Easily

Berlin Admits Steel Center Bristling With Arms Will Battle Till Last Man

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts)—(AP)—The Russians are fighting to make Stalingrad a "Red Verdun" and the Volga city has been converted into a vast fortress which will not be easy to take, Nazi military informants said today.

"The Soviets are fighting with their backs to the wall; they are faced with the alternate of either capitulating or fighting to the last man," said one high military man. "They will certainly not capitulate," he added.

In the savage fighting about the city the High Command said German infantry had stormed several of the modern forts in one belt of Stalingrad's fortifications, but said the Russians had launched strong relieving attacks to the northwest. These attacks were delayed repeatedly.

Amazing Russians Stall Reich Army

Only Enemy Advance Registered By Forces Above Novorossisk

By EDDY GILMORE AP War Correspondent MOSCOW (AP)—Showing an amazing power of recuperation, the Red Army was reported today to have checked a German blitz on Stalingrad and stopped the German advance upon that Volga River industrial center.

In the Caucasus also, military advisers said, the Russians were checking a German progress, and in the central and eastern sectors were counter-attacking.

The only enemy advance recorded in today's dispatches was in the single sector of the Western Caucasus above the Black Sea Naval Station of Novorossisk.
