That is the North Carolina surplus, friend, they will be saying. That is the biggest in the United States. That's is, brother. We got all that money tucked away. I don't know where it came from, except maybe we're making more money than we ever figgered to. It don't sound like us, being near the bottom of every list, being fullerate and unhealthy and backward. But money is what we've got. It sounds like something out of the New Deal, that figure, but it's surplus, and not deficit.

What can we do with that surplus? That will be a question for the little people to ask. But it will not be for them to decide. If it were left to the small taxpayer—who has it in his mind that he himself built up all that historic pile of surplus cash—he might decide to break it out and divide it up again. But it is left to the Governor, the Council of State, and the next Legislature. Much of that pile will have been burned up naturally before the Legislature gets its hands on it.
