NEW DELHI—(AP)—The British Navy's coastal ships in the Bay of Bengal unleashed their guns on Japanese positions in the Donabak area of Western Burma yesterday, while advanced units of the land forces continued their progress southward in the Mayu Peninsula toward the city, a British communiqué said today.

Claim Sub Successes Sinking Of 32 Ships & Destroyer Claimed

By ASSOCIATED PRESS A DNB dispatch broadcast by the Berlin radio and recorded by the Associated Press declared today that Nazi submarines had sunk 32 cargo ships and a destroyer in a prolonged attack against an east-bound Allied convoy in the Atlantic.

Report 35,000 Jews Killed

LONDON—(AP)—At least 35,000 Jews—the entire Jewish population of the Polish towns—have been killed by German secret police, the Polish Government-in-exile reported today.

Optimistic Crop Report Seen As Easing Concern Over Shortages

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A Government report today that the nation's crop and livestock feed supplies are plentiful and that the total production of major crops was about 3.5 per cent larger than a year ago when the nation's food output reached a record level, many informed observers had forecast a reduction in acreage this year due to manpower, machinery and fertilizer shortages and to reported farmer dissatisfaction with some Government farm price policies.

Nazis Pour Men, Planes Into Area Of Fighting But Reds Push On Toward Smolensk

MOSCOW (AP)—The Red Army still struggled today to hold its defense lines along the twisting northern Donets River east and southeast of Khar'kov against the increasing number of German tanks, men and planes being poured into the front by many of them apparently being brought up through Khar'kov.

Tax Plan Outlined Committee Criticized Skip-Year Idea

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee, in a majority report outlining the Administration's new tax collection plan, today sharply criticized the committee proposal for skipping 1943 levies as "like robbing Peter to pay a bonus to Paul."

RAID DEATH TOLL RISES
