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Soviets Try To Increase Tempo of Offensives

Kuban Valley Base Captured

By EDDY GILMORE MOSCOW (AP)—Over-coming the worst kinds of transportation difficulties, the Red Army struggled to increase the tempo of offensives despite the bad weather.

In the Kuban Valley of the Western Caucasus, the Soviet troops drove on from Anzasskaya one of the Germans' last good bases on the eastern side of the Kerch Strait.

The Soviet communiqué announced its capture yesterday. The first is about 42 miles from the sea.

There was evidence along other fronts that the Russians by their great effort at quiet consolidation of their gains, were beginning to give the Germans fresh worries.

The Red Army had to use roads across the marshlands because the trains had wrecked the railways they moved back. The Germans, on the other hand, had called on lines supplying the front from Simlenak.

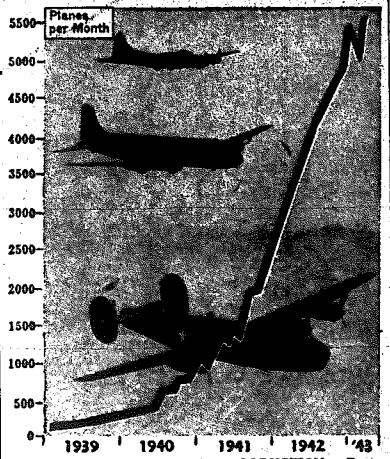

Invasion Fears Shown by Allied Chutists Reported in Norway; Southeast Europe Scares Rumored

LONDON (AP)—Signs of increasing Axis invasion jitters from the Balkan frontier to the Scandinavian peninsula were highlighted today by a roundabout report that Allied parachute troops had established a base in the Norwegian mountains and had sailed out in raids on Nazi-controlled factories.

The Norwegian government-in-exile here, commenting upon the report, declared that "quitting and the Germans appear to be genuinely alarmed," but said it could not give any confirmation.

The story came to London in Stockholm dispatches which said the Allied parachute base was somewhere in the Hardanger-Vidda Mountain Lakes area, an ideal district for an air force base that is equipped with a meteorological station.

TROOPS IN HUNT The London Daily Press quoted the German radio as announcing that Nazi troops are hunting the paratroopers in the mountains of Norway.

On the southern border of the Allied invasion area, meanwhile, Italian Fascist Minister Alessandro Pavolini announced today that the sea of the Italian boot had become a fortified outpost of the European continent itself against any and all attacks coming from the Mediterranean.

Morgenthau Doubts That Program Can Come Before January 1

WASHINGTON (AP)—Treasury Secretary Morgenthau said today he is hopeful new and "complete" tax legislation, embracing both additional revenue and a withholding plan, can be enacted by Fall.
