Italian Press In Effort To Steel People

BERN—(AP)—The Italian press, apparently certain that the increased tempo of Allied raids on Sicilian, Sardinian and Italian mainland cities is a signal that invasion is imminent, is stepping up its attempts to steel the civilian population for the blow

Taking a sternly realistic slant, editors warned over the week-end that e rry Italian would be expected to play a part in defense of the humeland, and one paper asserted that cities would be turned into "fortresses" which would be defended street by street.

"The soldiers will have cannon and the people guns and knives," declared this article. "Everyone will fight—the rich and the poor, the industrialists, the workers, the women and the children."

EXPECT ATTACK

Certainty that invasion is near was voiced by Il Popolo Di Roma, which acknowledges that heavy material damage had been inflicted by the Allied air forces and added age had been inflicted by the Allied air forces and added that these aerial attacks could mean only one thing, "preparation for invasion." It also reported new concentrations of invasion barges along the North African coast and said that British transports were pouring war material into North Africa from Gibraltar.
