Churches and religious institutions will, to the extent possible, be spared the devastations of war during the struggle ahead. I look forward, as does your Holiness, to the bright days and the peace of God returning to the world. We are convinced that the only way to bring about peace and order in Europe and Asia and elsewhere has been to destroy the forces of evil and to turn our energies from the grim duties of war to the fruitful tasks of reconstruction. We are confident that other nations and forces imbued with the spirit of goodwill toward mankind will join us in our quest for peace and order. We will turn our hearts and our minds to the exacting task of building a just and enduring peace on earth."
