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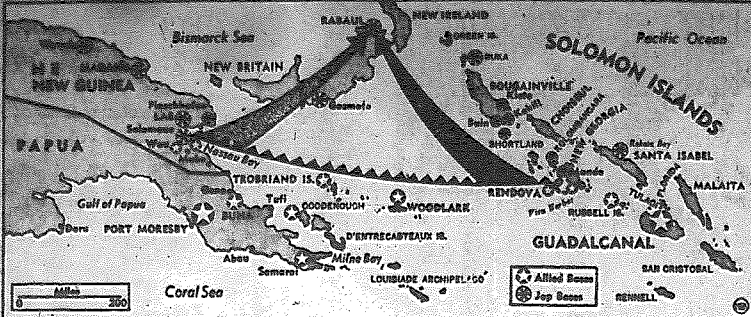

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Regaining consciousness in mid-air after a crash landing, a Yank pilot slashed into a swarm of Japanese Zeros with his bare propellor blades. The pilot, who was flying a P-40, was shot down by a Zero. He bled heavily but managed to land safely. The Zero was destroyed.

7 Killed By Violence In July 4th Week-End

At least seven persons died by violence in North Carolina during the week-end.
Dunale Lee Tilley, 23-year-old employee of a cotton mill, was killed by a train just outside Durham.
Paul Barrier, nine, of Concord, was struck and killed by an automobile near his home.
A man identified by officers as Jack Talbert, 29, of Stoneville, was found dead on the Mayfield - Stoneville Highway. The body and head had been bruised and cut. State Highway Patrolman J. H. Jackson is investigating to determine whether Talbert was killed by an automobile or slugged and placed on the highway.
Mrs. J. A. Perry, 50-year-old employee of a Hatterfield department store, burned to death in a blaze that swept through the building. She was trapped on the second floor.
S. R. High, 55, of Durham, was killed in the northeast Cape Fear River, near Wilmington, when two boats bearing a fishing party capsized. Three companions were killed.
An unidentified Negro drowned in the surf at a Negro beach resort near here.
Anna Crawford Derr, Negro woman about 20 years of age, was killed when her automobile and a train collided at a grade crossing in Gastonia.

Rhodes In Charge

Replaces Davis at Navy Office Here

Chief Specialist C. R. Rhodes was in charge of the Charlotte Navy Recruiting Station here today as Chief Bookman's Mate W. H. Davis began a leave that will conclude on the eve of his returning to sea duty July 15.

Chief Rhodes is slated to succeed Chief Davis as recruiter in charge, according to an announcement made several days ago by Commander Charles Neely of Raleigh, state recruiting officer. Chief Davis requested the transfer to sea duty.

Incidentally, Chief Rhodes announced today that three recruits attached to the Charlotte station had already made the honor roll for recruiting this month. The honor roll is announced weekly, but concerns activities during prior days of the calendar month.

H. S. Lee, specialist 1-c, led the local recruits with four recruits enlisted in two days. A. J. Campbell, yeoman 3-c, and B. W. Nash, yeoman 3-c, followed in order.

OPA Scored By Cattle Spokesman, Defended By Congressman Rogers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Office of Price Administration (OPA) was criticized as an agency for over-throwing the American system and defended as the butt of "Hate Roosevelt" politics in a letter here last night.

Representative Will Rogers Jr., Democrat, California, declared Republican critics of OPA seem to be working to discredit President Roosevelt, instead of trying to check inflation.

"To me it is regretful that the leaders of the Republican Party have allowed themselves to become the spearhead of this interference with our national economy," Rogers said.

Judge Joe Montague, general counsel for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, however, charged that the activities of OPA officials "have convinced native-born Americans that they are deliberately using the terror of war to bring about a complete reconstruction of the social, economic and political life of the country."

OPA officials, he added, have yielded to the demand that any individual or any industry that has operated successfully "is per se a criminal" and must be strictly controlled.
