

DANISH UPSETTING SOARDS TO NEW HELM

Discussions Stalemated On How To Stop Revolt 120 Persons Are Arrested

By JOHN H. COLBURN STOKHOLM (AP)—Denmark's "quiet revolt" against German occupation soared to new heights today as the Danish Government and Nazi authorities reached a stalemate in their discussions on how to halt the riots and sabotage.

One hundred and twenty persons were reported arrested by Danish police yesterday as they broke up, with the aid of German soldiers, a riot in the Rindshjalsplads in the center of Copenhagen.

It was the second successive day that large crowds had demonstrated in the Raadhushjalsplads, while sabotage, general strikes and disorders between Danes and German soldiers continued throughout Denmark.

Saboteurs were said to have caused damage estimated at 1,500,000 Danish crowns when they exploded bombs in the Lauritz Knudsen Electrical Appliance Works in Copenhagen.

Meanwhile residents of Heleneborg in Sweden reported they had heard terrific explosions across the narrow three-mile stretch of water at Helingsborg in Denmark.

Swedish advisers said strikes by workers extended to the cities of Vordingborg and Viborg, where the populations joined those of other cities in protesting against the lack of discipline by German soldiers.

Yank Bombs Hit Italy Airdromes Squashed In Scorching Attacks

By NOLAN NORGAARD ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA (AP)—United States heavy and medium bombers in strong force renewed their assault on the Italian Peninsula yesterday with a set of scorching attacks on key airdromes.

While the Fortresses hit Capua, seventeen miles north of Naples on a rail line, and the Marauders struck Grosseto, in the vicinity of Naples, RAF Wellingtons also carried out night operations in the suburbs of Naples, rearing over Brenno again with blockbusters.

Red Forces Continuing Pressure In Ukraine Area Moscow Reports New Advance

MOSCOW (AP)—Russian troops of the Kharkov region have backed German forces three and one-half miles further westward through the Ukraine River defenses and also have struck due south in a new flanking maneuver, it was announced today.

THE DONETS BASIN itself, the Southwest Army group, commanded by Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky absorbed frequent Axis counterattacks south of Izium and southeast of Voroshilovgrad, killing 2,000 of the enemy and destroying 46 tanks.

Repulse Nazi Attack Yesterday's advances by Gen. Konev's troops west of Kharkov halted out the enemy and captured several villages. Numerous enemy counter attacks were beaten off.

Hits Fifth Columnists Bracken Says Russia Will Not Make Peace

BRACKEN, British Minister of Information, asserted at a press conference today "uncolonists" who he said focused on the Russian front by spreading rumors that Soviet Russia might seek a separate peace with Germany.

He said that Stalin's inability to attend conferences or the shifting of ambassadors to the United States and Great Britain implies any deal with Germany.

Bracken asserted "the greatest disaster that can be done in the United States is to spread rumor that Russia may drop out of the war and be added."

Japs Forced Back By Air And Ground Assaults Bombers Attack In Heavy Force

By WILLIAM F. BONI ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC (AP)—Using the biggest concentration of heavy and medium bombers yet to be employed in the Southwest Pacific, Lt. Gen. George C. Kenney's Fifth Airforce attacked Salamaua's supply base at Hansa Bay, New Guinea, Thursday with 180 tons of bombs.

The raiders were over the targets for more than an hour, escorted by Lightning fighters, bombing Japanese installations, some of the Allied raiders were damaged by anti-aircraft fire but there was no indication of losses in today's communique which reported the attack.

Hansa Bay, approximately 200 miles up the New Guinea coast from Salamaua, is an important supply and shipping base.

Typical reports of returning pilots were those from a formation of Mitchells which scored a direct hit on a Japanese anti-aircraft battery. The Mitchells, before turning for home, sought out the anti-aircraft site and silenced some of them.

Targets attacked included Condor Point, anti-aircraft battery at Hansa Bay; a plantation just south of Condor Point; Kribin, main settlement of the bay; Kronprinz and Ellet Freidrich harbors along the coast towards Madang.
