The amphibious operations in Italy seem to us almost a miracle of war. In a relatively small, compact battle zone, Alfied troops were put ashore in great numbers behind enemy lines and on enemy flanks supposedly alert to every danger.
And yet the operations began with ease, almost without re-sistance. It is almost unbelievable that such a move could have taken place, involving hundreds of vessels and thousands of men, without the enemy becoming aware of our intentions and moving over short lines to

and moving over about lines to meet the threat.


