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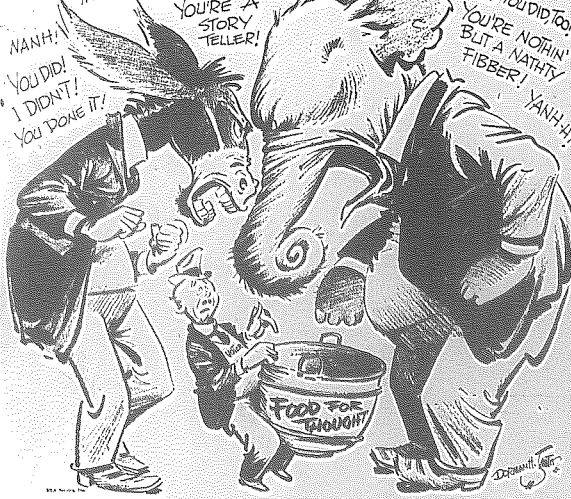

Argentine Lifts One More Challenge

It may be assumed that Argentina, in calling for a special session of Pan-American nations, is not simply seeking her day in court. The program, which is largely unrecognized, she has moved steadily and without compromise toward aggressive militarism. Not only has Argentina aided the Axis nations.

The well-armed nation which has announced its plans to dominate South America by one means or another makes ready to challenge U. S. leadership. This much is certain. To South American nations accustomed to dictatorial rule, and harboring ill-feeling and suspicion of the United States, the Argentine plan may be appealing. Only the realization that U. S. power in this hemisphere can be challenged only at grave risk will restrain Argentina's sister nations. The result of U. S. enmity is too plainly revealed in the virtual boycott of Argentina. And the result of U. S. friendship is as plainly seen in the building of Brazil's armed forces.
