MOSCOW (AP)—A wide column of Russian troops, looking about two sides of Budapest today while the main Russian forces holding the city were reorganizing their positions in the capital's southern suburbs against desperate Nazi counterattacks.

Chinese Admit Japs In Kweichow

CHUNGKING (AP)—The Japanese have a force of about 300,000 men into the sprawling battle-line town of Kweichow, the Chinese High Command announced today, admitting that the enemy has broken into Kweichow, the province's capital.

Sweden Fears Baltic Sinkings

NEW YORK (AP)—Sweden has protested vigorously to Berlin that the German U-boat fleet should be sunk without warning, a Stockholm dispatch to the American Swedish News Exchange said today.
