## House Unable To Override Veto Of Bill

Voices 226 To 151 To Pass Measure; 25 Short Of Necessary Two-Thirds

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Roosevelt fired the anti-subsidy bill back to Congress with a veto today and promptly won his battle for subsidies when opponents failed to muster enough strength to override the veto in the House.

The House vote, 226 to 151, was short of the necessary two-thirds majority. This the veto was sustained on that occasion also.

Mr. Roosevelt, in his veto message, called the subsidy repealer "an inflation measure, a high cost of living measure, a food shortage measure—the same language he used in rejecting similar legislation last Summer. His veto was sustained by a substantial number of Democrats from farming areas.

NO SENATE ACTION  
The House action obstructed the passage of the bill extending the life of the Commodore Credit Corporation, which expired yesterday.

Mr. Roosevelt said that, in effect, would veto a congressional bill and repeal the Economic Stabilization Act.

He said no major wartime nation had been able to stabilize living costs without subsidies and that he did not see how the war was being held if the bill became law.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES.—(AP)—Allied troops, moving up under cover of a thundering six-hour barrage from hundreds of guns, one of the most intense of the Mediterranean war, began an attack on the town of Cassino and the slopes of Mt. Cassino before dawn this morning.

The attack on Cassino and Mt. Cassino was the first of a series of attacks which will be the benefit of a steady hail of shells which swirled like a whirl from the lower hills, mountain and back again where the Germans were holding out in pillboxes and bunkers.

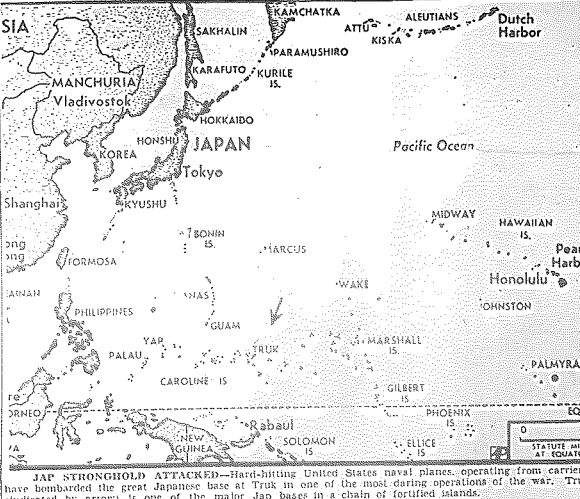

## Silence About Operation Leaves Open Possibility Attack Is Continuing

U. S. PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, PEARL HARBOR.—(AP)—Japan's mighty naval base at Truk, crowded with warships, was attacked for the first time in the war Wednesday. Today official silence left open the possibility that the powerful American aircraft carrier task force had prolonged the heavy assault.

The carriers, protected by battleships, cruisers and destroyers, sent several hundred planes at dawn Feb. 16 striking Truk, the mid-Pacific guardian of Japan, 2,100 statute miles to its northwest.
