An estimate of 16,750 American fighters and bombers today began the daylight assault on a dawn attack on French and German targets.

Eighth Army Smashes At Hitler Line As New Phase Of Battle Opens

By NOLAN NORGARD ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples—(AP)—The Allies on the Anzio beachhead smashed forward today in a mighty offensive and simultaneously the Eighth Army drove against the Hitler line from the east, opening a new phase of the battle in Italy to crush the German armies. At the same time other Fifth Army forces hammered upon Nazi defenses on the coast sector—only 22 miles below the beachhead. Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark personally directed the assault as the beachhead force, swollen by reinforcements, struck as though in an explosion of the tightly-hemmed mass of military strength.

Old Burma Road Cut By Chinese

CHUNGKING—(AP)—The Chinese High Command announced today that Chinese forces striking for the Burma border from the Salween River have cut the old Burma Road at Chingang, only 248 miles from the Burma frontier. The Chinese victory isolated the main enemy Burma Rd. head at Lushan, 35 miles to the northeast by cutting its supply route from Mandalay. The communists add the Japanese garrison at Chingang was encircled and wiped out by the advancing Chinese.

Major Attack By Soviets Awaited

LONDON—(AP)—Small-scale German reconnaissance attacks in the area of Trapat in the lower Dnieper River Valley were reported today by Moscow as a full contingent along the rest of the long eastern front—a full military commentators on both sides again predicted would end soon. The Nazi attacks yesterday along the Dnieper valley were reported and 300 Germans were killed in the sporadic fighting, said a Russian communique broadcast by Moscow and recorded by the Soviet monitor here.

Doughboys And Tanks Lead Way

By DANIEL DE LUCE ANZIO BEACHHEAD, Italy.—American tanks and doughboys smashed today at the smoldering German line guarding the Apennine Way to Rome in the greatest Allied attack from the beachhead since the Allies landed Jan. 22. Under the eyes of Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark, Fifth Army commander, thousands of veteran United States infantrymen and hundreds of armored vehicles began the attack at 6:30 A. M. after massed artillery had loosed a half hour barrage and light bombers had blasted German positions in the forward enemy positions. Supported by the fire of American warships offshore, British Tommies stormed into German positions along the Apennine Way in a series of attacks on the northeastern extremity of the beachhead.

Parisans Strike Blows

LONDON—(AP)—Marshal Desp. Brez announced today that his Yugoslav Partisans have killed more than 200 Germans and Chetniks in violent battles on a 50-mile front extending from the vicinity of Newgradi, 100 miles southeast of Mostar in Hercegovina, to Gacko and south to Tribuzo. The broadest communique also said that the Partisans had killed and captured in battles in eastern Bosnia and had captured a German column transporting ammunition and food. The Germans were declared to be bringing up reinforcements in Dalmatia, but the war bulletin said the Partisans still maintained the initiative in that coastal area. Heavy losses were said to have been caused the enemy when Tito's forces blew up two trains on the Zarem-Belgrade line near the Gacko. These also were reported blown up on rail lines leading from Trieste and Pola Adriatic ports in northeastern Italy.
