

MOST MEATS DECLARED RATION FREE

Beef Steaks And Roasts Not Removed All Other Meats Take No Points



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WASHINGTON (AP)—The Office of Price Administration today made all meats except beef steaks and beef roasts ration free, effective at midnight.

The removal of ration points, announced by OPA Administrator Bowles at a surprise press conference, covers all cuts of beef, veal, lamb and mutton; all beef except steaks and roasts; beef hamburger, beef steaks, all kinds of variety meats, sausage, ready-to-eat meats, canned meats and canned soups.

The action was taken, Bowles said, because lead-beef pork, which has been rationed since the war, is being sold at a profit of 200 percent.
