

Gaston Sergeant Slain Fighting In Invasion

GASTONIA—Sgt. Jennings E. Fort of East Gastonia, native and lifelong resident of Gaston County, was killed in action the second day of the invasion operations, June 7, his father, S. A. Fort, well known East Gastonian, was notified in a telegraphic communication from the War Department.

The message was as follows: "S. A. Fort: The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your son, S. Fort, was killed in action June 7 in England. Letter follows. Ulla, The Adjutant General."

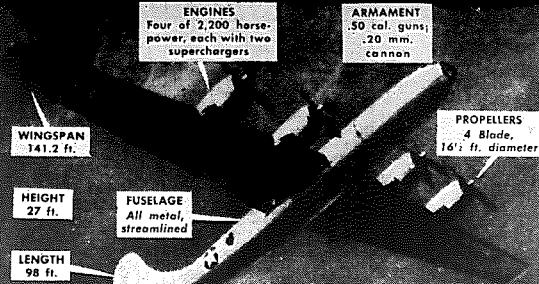
Sgt. Fort, an airplane mechanic with the United States armed forces, had been overseas about a year, and had served previously in the campaigns in Sicily and Italy. He was transferred to England about two months ago, and was at the time of his death at the airfield at Kansas City, Mo., Maxton, N. C., and Camden, N. C., before going overseas for duty in combat areas.

While the telegraphic notification received by Mr. Fort stated that Sgt. Fort had been killed in action in England, it was presumed that this designation "England," apparently meant the invasion area, including not only England but the territory covered by the invasion operations launched from the shores of England.

Sgt. Fort is survived by his father and two brothers, S. Fort of East Gastonia, his father, and P. C. Cleveland Fort, who is stationed in England, and Boyce Fort, who is with the U. S. Navy, stationed in California.

Also surviving are his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Warren of East Gastonia.

Heat Waves Broken In Most Of New England, South & Midwest

Fast-tumbling temperatures in

the wake of rain and fresh thun-

derstorms were reported today

throughout most of New England,

the South and Middle West, while

Alaska continued to suffer from a

severe week-long heat wave.

At least ten deaths occurred as

a result of the three-day hot

spell in the eastern half of the

country which began to break Sun-

day.

Temperatures in the Middle

West plunged as much as 45 de-

grees. Ohioans experienced a low

of 55 last night after suffering

Sunday in a record heat for the

day of 101-12. Similar drops were

recorded in St. Louis, Louisville

and Chicago.

TEXAS HOT

Although most of the South re-

ceived some relief, Texas still was

hot with El Paso and Dallas re-

porting highs of 100 and 99 de-

grees.

Albuquerque, N. M., underwent

the hottest weather of the season

yet, with a 100 degree tem-

perature equalling the record for

the date.

ALLIES REVOKE

BAN ON TRAVEL

LONDON—P—The pre-invasion

ban on travel by diplomats and

restrictions on their communi-

cations, imposed April 17 on all but

those from the United States,

Britain and Soviet Russia, was

revoked by the Foreign Office last

night.

A few exceptions were made for

other nations. Gen. Charles de

Gaulle visited and left London.

Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk

of the Polish Government-in-exile

made a trip to the United States.

Electrical and windstorms caused much damage in Michigan, Wisconsin and Alaska. One man died of heat prostration in Alabama, two of drowning and one from being struck by lightning in West Virginia.

In Maryland (three persons were drowned one killed in a dive off a pier and one killed when he fell from a scaffolding after being overcome by the heat), lightning bolt killed a man at Fort Jefferson, Long Island.

Cool weather prevailed in Michigan. In Iowa, Wisconsin, New York, Pennsylvania, New England and the Kansas City region.

In Alaska several cases of heat prostration and severe sunburn caused physicians to warn residents to remain out of the direct rays of the sun as much as possible.
