Yank Rocket-Buster Tells Story Of War On Nazi Secret Weapon

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following was written by Lt. Lewis W. Powers, Albuquerque, New Mexico, who shot down three-and-a-half robot planes, making him America's leading "doodle-bug ace". Powers has been in the Army for six years and in the Air Corps since March, 1943.

On a mission north of Paris, when we got back, my flight was scheduled to land last. We had a little gas left, so while we were waiting to land, my flight leader suggested that we split up and go out looking for these things.

I hadn't been out but a short time when I heard an RAF base calling out the position of one of them. So I beat it over there. At first I thought it was going to be hard to recognize these things. But when I first saw it, I knew in a flash what it was. It was a sort of freakish looking thing. There wasn't any propeller and its tail looked awfully funny because of that jet thing sticking right on the top of the fuselage with fire coming out of it. It got under me and tips and it looks something like a miniature Mustang with tapering leading and trailing edges.

I was up about 5,000 feet and it was down at 2,000, moving fast. The doodlebug was coming in parallel to me and I did not see it until it was under me. The flak started coming in and that helped to keep the pilotless plane in sight until I was within range.

FIRST KILL

I was a little worried about what would happen to me if it exploded when hit, so I started firing when I was quite far away. I was diving pretty fast and the first thing I knew I had overbored my target. I pulled back and flew right beside it. The doodlebug was flying perfectly straight so I got a good look. It looks like some 25th Century craft.

I followed the robot raider over the field and landed on it from below. I like that and because you've got a big area to hit and the fourth bullet it started like a big blue flame burst out and it just snapped over and hit the ground in a big field.

There was a house in the field and the explosion blew the roof off and smashed all the windows and killed a lot of stock. My counter it made a pretty big crater.

That was my first doodlebug. Then the next night I was playing volley ball when our intelligence officer said that the RAF wanted a couple of us to go out and patrol. I stayed up there about an hour and a half, but did not see anything and so landed again. I was pretty sore about my wasted search and asked if I could not go up again. I hadn't more than got up this time when I saw one. I chased the gadget about fifteen miles before I caught it. It caught fire, rolled over, and went down. I was beginning to like this.

A little later the same night I saw a jet flame moving fast. I caught it about ten miles inland. The doodlebug turned into the biggest ball of flame you ever saw and exploded. I was at the top of my climb, but the explosion bounced me around even so.

Shooting doodlebugs gets to be pretty much the same after the first few. An RAF typhoon and I took up on the last one I saw, and we knocked him out together.

I think the doodlebug is just a foolish German gadget. It is nothing more than that, it certainly won't change war at all.

Tool Workers Will Return

HOUSTON, Tex. — Striking employees of the Hughes Tool Co. have voted to return to work in compliance with a National War Labor Board directive.

The vote was taken after the board yesterday ordered the employees to return to their jobs immediately and it simultaneously refused the company's request for a rehearing on the board's union maintenance of membership directive.

Noah Dietrich, Hughes executive vice-president, said no action would be taken on the board's order for the company to renege its contract with the United Steel Workers (USW) and include a standard maintenance of membership clause "and all the men have returned to work."

The work stoppage began last Friday in what union leaders called a protest of the company's refusal to obey the directive. Union officials said 2,000 had quit work while company spokesmen said about 1,200 were still.
