130 German Planes Fall In Great Battle

American Fighters Riddle Luftwaffe In Biggest Air Combat Ever Fought Over Reich

LONDON (AP)—American fighters escorting 1,000 heavy bombers attacking Nazi oil plants in Germany today shot down 130 enemy planes in the greatest air battle ever fought over the Reich between American fighters and the Luftwaffe. Only yesterday, the American fighters destroyed 125 German planes but 119 were caught on the ground in Western Germany. Today's bag made the two-day total 255. It was the fourth consecutive day in which 100 or more American bombers had attacked Germany. The continental skies were stirred by Allied planes rising from bases in England, Italy, North and South France.

Red Forces Roll Closer To Hungary

Drive Nazis Out Of Strongholds

By DANIEL DE LUCE MOSCOW (AP)—The Red Army by frontal and flank assaults was driving German and Hungarian troops today from their strongholds in the eastern Carpathians, after crushing enemy resistance in the Transylvanian Alps. Armored columns under the command of Russia's newest marshal, Egor V. Malinovsky, were less than 50 miles from the Transylvanian capital of Cluj. His forces, advancing steadily from the northwest and southeast, were rapidly seizing control of the entire mountain belt that had protected Hungary from invasion.

Americans In Drive Close To Nazi Border

Capital Of Luxembourg Captured As First Army Pushed Toward Reich

By JAMES M. LONG LONDON (AP)—The U. S. First Army fought its way into the first barrage zones and mine fields of the dragon-toothed Siegfried Line today. British armor broke into Holland at a point 14 miles north of the ruptured Albert Canal defenses in a sweep toward the north end of the German main justification. The Americans were less than 10 miles from the German frontier at two points 70 miles apart. They captured Luxembourg, the capital of the pocket Duchy bordering the Rhineland and Saarland, in one thrust and reportedly threw shells into Aachen, German border city, in their forward movement.

Croatian Leader Out

LONDON (AP)—The anti-German tide in the Balkans has swept another Hitler puppet out of office, it was reported today, making more precarious the predicament of an estimated 250,000 Nazi troops in once German-dominated territory in southeastern Europe.

Dijon Falls To French

ROME (AP)—French forces from the south after a 24-hour battle have occupied the city of Dijon, 150 miles southeast of Paris and 85 miles from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's troops in Northern France. It was announced tonight.

French Again Outwit Nazis

PARIS (AP)—Underground industry flourishing in France during the German occupation, producing a new six-engine airplane which is potential competition for the American Glenn Martin Mars, the Air Ministry disclosed today.

May Let Up On Wage Freezing

NEW YORK (AP)—A decision today by the War Relocation Authority to let up on wage freezing in the war zone, according to the New York Times, would be a significant step toward the end of the rationing program.

Floods Rage In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP)—President Manuel Avila Camacho, today took steps to relieve suffering in flood-stricken areas throughout Mexico, particularly at Parral, Chihuahua, population 10,000 where the bodies of 48 victims were reported to have been recovered. Another 108 persons were listed as missing.

Soviet Patrols Said To Be In East Prussia

NEW YORK (AP)—The British radio reported today that "front-line" dispatches say that the Red Army is reported to have crossed the German fortifications on the East Prussian border, which include everything from a simple trench to a well-entrenched position.

Fifth Army Reaches Gothic Line Region
