But after Pearl Harbor, when the entire nation was mobilized and maneuvers brought troops swarming into the area, it became a haven for thousands of transient soldiers, sailors, and marines.

Hundreds of letters on file at the club attest to its success, and pay tribute to the volunteer workers who contributed so much time and energy to its operation. It was, in the best sense, a community enterprise—25 senior hostesses, 50 junior hostesses, and more than 1,-

000 Victory Belles worked long and hard to rout the loneliness of the servicemen who turned up in droves at 208 1-2 South Tryon.

The Club is going out of business Monday night, and far from being an occasion for sadness, the final locking of the door is good news, indeed. Business has been falling off steadily for months: the throng of visitors has become a trickle.

The servicemen have become veterans, and loneliness is no longer listed among their troubles. The staggering dislocations of the war years are over, and the men in uniform who pass through Charlotte these days are headed for home.
